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

#### ROLLING AN UMBRELLA.

Thie Expert Makes It a Rather Com plicated Operation.

men can roll up an umbrelle Here is the method I was It is not very pretty, but it is effective. You begin by folding up a sheet of newspaper to form a little pad: otherwise you are apt to spoll your wall paper. Now for the rest.

Hold the umbrella borizontally. Hol the mid of paper against the wall hang down. Then pull out each fold through the left hand with a screwing

Do not let go of the tops of the ribe of the umbrella. When you have to giove the hand slide it around. If you let go you will find that the ribs get out of place, and then the folds of the brella will follow suit. When the umbrella is rolled up grip it tightly until you have fastened it. If you fall in that detail you will get an unsightly bulge in the center of the umbrella .-
