### CHICAGO "LITTLE THEATRE" TO OPEN

Located Fourth Floor, Fine Arts Building. "Sundry Lovers" Title of Opening Performance

The Little Theatre on the fourth floor of the Fine Arts Building opened its third season on Tuesday, October 20th, with a group of one act plays to which the collective title, "Sundry Lovers" has been given. The three plays consist of St. John Hankin's "The Constant Lover," Lord Dunsany's "The Lost Silk Hat" and "Jael," an imaginative play based on the Old Testament story, by Miss Florence Kiper, a young Chicago writer. Comedy is the prevailing note in "Sundry Lovers" in accordance with the policy announced by the directors since their return from Europe of devoting the major portion of the Little Theatre's activities this season to the production of lighter and more humorous plays than have been given during the past two seasons of the "Little." This policy is based on the belief that present conditions have produced a demand for humor and relaxation in the theatre which is perfectly legitimate, and which the directors of the "Little" will endeavor throughout the season to meet.

### Woolwich Arsenal.

Woolwich arsenal owed its establishment to an explosion which took place at a foundry in Moorfields. Until 1716 the government obtained its ordnance from private manufacturers, but in that year the explosion decided it to build a foundry of its own, and Woolwich, already famous as a naval station, was chosen as the site. Woolwich was only a small fishing village until the sixteenth century, when Henry VIII. laid the foundations of its prosperity by making it the royal dockyard. —London Chronicle.
