Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the city council of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, having ordered that a supplemental special assessment be levied to pay the deficiency of the cost of the work and interest for the construction of a subway under the tracks of the Chicago and Northwestern Ry. Company, and the grading, draining, curbing and paving with a brick pavement, with bitumen filler, upon a concrete base with sand cushion including the re-adjustment of intersecting pavements and of the sanitary sewer, and the construction of sidewalks and otherwise improving Laurel Ave., from the west line of paving on St. Johns Ave. westerly to the paved roadway on First St., and including the intersection with the paved roadway on First St., all in the city of Highland Park, Illinois, which improvement was provided for by an ordinance passed heretofore on the 6th day of October A. D. 1914, and the lawful expenses of such proceeding, the ordinance for said supplemental special assessment being on file in the office of the city clerk of said city, and having applied to the county court of Lake county for an assessment of the costs of said improvement, according to benefits, and a supplemental special assessment thereof having been made and returned to said court, the final hearing thereon will be had on the 5th day of December A. D. 1914 or as soon thereafter as the business of the court will permit.

Said supplemental special assessment is payable in one installment. All persons owning or having an interest in any property subject to said assessment may file objections in said court before said day, and may appear on the hearing and make their defense.
