Supplemental Special Assessment Notice No. 181

Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the city council of the City of Highland Park, county of Lake and State of Illinois, having ordered that a supplemental special assessment be levied to pay the deficiency of the cost of the work and interest for grading, draining, curbing, paving with macadam and otherwise improving of Gage avenue in the City of Highland Park, from the southerly line of Lincoln avenue southerly to the southerly line of Gray avenue, which improvement was provided for by an ordinance framed heretofore on the 21st day of June, A. D. 1910, which improvement was provided for by an ordinance passed heretofore on the sixth day of October, A. D. 1914, and the lawful expenses of such proceeding, the ordinance for said supplemental special assessment being on file in the office of the city clerk of said city, and having applied to the county court of Lake county for an assessment of the costs of said improvement, according to benefits, and a supplemental special assessment thereof having been made and returned to said court, the final hearing will be had on the 11th day of December, A. D. 1914, or as soon thereafter as the business of the court will permit.

Said supplemental special assessment is payable in one installment. All persons desiring may file objections in said court before said day, and may appear on the hearing and make their defense.

At Elm Place School

Elm Place school closes today for the Thanksgiving recess and will not reopen until Monday.
