Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the city council of the city of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, having ordered that a supplemental special assessment be levied to pay the deficiency of the cost of the work and interest for the construction of a sewer main in McDaniel Ave., and McDaniel Ave., produced southerly together with a lateral sewer, manholes, flushing connection, house connections, and a sewage purification works, with an outlet pipe therefrom, also creating a sewer district therefor, to be known as sewer District "G", which improvement was provided for by an ordinance passed heretofore on the second day of August A. Smokeless Breakfast Bacon.
