MILITARY COSTUMES.

Dashing Mantles and Cape Suits a la Mode.



What is new in fashions is the attempt to introduce a military style into feminine costumes. There is the military mantle now being worn, giving a martial look to more than one young woman when seen at a little distance, especially if she happens to be tall, which many Frenchwomen are at the present day.

The officer's cloak is worn well off the shoulders, having in this respect something of the effect of a mantel de cour. Beneath shows a corsage or fillet adorned with brandebourgs a la hussard.

The military-cape suit pictured here is of copenhagen blue serge, with a high turned over collar and front vest effect. Worn with it are a plaited tunic and a plain skirt. A wide rimmed hat of blue velvet, with a white flower drooping over the upturned side, accompanied it.

LINGERIE RIBBONS.

A Dainty Case Designed For Their Safe Keeping.

Keeping the ribbons from the lingerie fresh is a problem for every woman. When the ribbons are taken out while the garment goes to the laundry they

are very apt to be matted and tangled. To obviate these difficulties a very pretty case may be made which is a charming little gift. Cut any handkerchief in half, hem the cut edge and fold it over within two inches of the border. This forms a baglike space which should be divided into four or five compartments made by stitching from the hemmed edge to the folded edge.

Into these pockets fit strips of cardboard wound with lingerie ribbons. Leave an inch wide margin before you begin the pockets and stitch a ribbon on the back or at one end. When the case is finished and filled roll it up like a necktie or shoe and wrap and tie with the ribbon.

Whenever the ribbons are removed from the clothes they should be wound around the cardboards and that will keep them fresh and firm. This makes an attractive and useful gift at very little cost.

Long Coats Are Smart.

The long, tight fitting coat, very full at the hem, has come in.

This type of coat is very much in evidence. Its advent marks a distinct change of the line, and for that reason it cannot be treated lightly. At the present moment the leading tailors are making these long coats in linen and shantung, and fashionable people are accepting the change with enthusiasm.

HOUSEHOLD HELPS.

A three minute glass (the kind used in the kitchen when cooking) will be found an excellent timepiece when doing long distance telephoning, as it allows three minutes only.

Vinegar placed in a bottle of dried up glue will moisten and make it liquid again.

Blankets which are not in use should have small pieces of thoroughly dried yellow soap scattered in the folds when they are put away. This keeps moths out.

Stale breadcrumbs mixed with a trifle of washing blue can be used for cleaning embossed velvet. A piece of white flannel should be used for applying the breadcrumbs, which will finally require brushing off with a clean, soft whisk.

To store silver place in a cardboard box a layer of ordinary flour, then lay the forks and spoons upon it and cover thickly with flour. They will remain quite bright for any length of time.

Always rub leather chairs over from time to time with a very little fresh milk applied with a soft, clean linen rag, rubbing the milk off lightly at once. This prevents the surface from drying and cracking. Should the surface be rubbed off apply a good leather restorer.

Fare For the Kiddies.

In diet less meat or gravy should be given to children in hot weather than usual. Potatoes should be reduced in quantity or altogether omitted, while porridge, lentils, beans and similar foods should be abandoned altogether.

Very often a few days' strict dieting, substituting fish or eggs entirely for meat or soup, fruit and custard and cold milk puddings for suet puddings of various kinds and reducing the quantity of butter eaten, will work wonders in the case of a child who has been fractious and unwell.

Green vegetables, especially spinach, are distinctly valuable, provided they are well cooked, but salads or raw vegetables in any form should never be given to young children.

Such a diet, especially by knocking off butter and possibly some quantity of the milk taken, will be somewhat lowering, but to combat this the addition of malted milk to the dietary will be found very beneficial. Indeed, it is good to let this take the place of ordinary milk or bread and milk once a day certainly for a while.

Nutritive Jellies.

A thing mothers neglect too much is the value of isinglass. Most children love jellies, and when made with a good isinglass they are extremely good; needless to say the ordinary jelly, though very nice, has no nutritive value and so is not a suitable food for children at all except by course, as a delicacy.

A nice and nutritious jelly is made by boiling one ounce of rice, sago and pearl barley together very slowly in three pints of water; strain the water and add to it one-half ounce of good isinglass (or more if the weather is very hot) and enough fruit juice to flavor it.

This jelly is very nourishing and is much liked by children, while the heat forming properties of the farinaceous foods are avoided at the same time that their food value is retained.

New Dolls From Old.

A doll with a broken head and arms can easily be transformed into a new toy. Make a rag-head and arms and stitch them to the body. Cover the whole with black sateen.

Take two white laces and two black shoe buttons; pierce the laces through the center, put the shanks of the black ones through them and stitch these on for eyes.

Run a bit of white tape down to make the nose and across for the mouth. Use black fur for the hair.

A bright red frock or a green plush jacket and breeches with red waistcoat and yellow tie is made for attire, and there is a splendid gollwog.
