deserving poor of that city.

Apparently Kenosha is the first city to have thought of trying the plan out and it is likely that within another week the store will be in operation and at least three hundred poor families of that city cared for in this manner. It works this way:

If a carpenter needs a pail of butterine and hasn't the money to pay for it he can go to Kenosha's municipal store, sign an agreement to do an hour's work for the city and receive the oleo.

If a laborer wants a sack of flour he can pledge himself to work on the streets a day and get the flour.

These things will be possible if the city council adopts a resolution which was introduced last night. The resolution calls for the establishment of a "time store" by the city. The matter was referred to a committee for investigation.

New Furniture Store for Waukegan.

Waukegan is to have another up-to-date furniture store. It will be conducted by Samuel Schwartz. It has been known for some little time that Mr. Schwartz was contemplating this move but the announcement was not made public until Monday.

Mr. Schwartz's aim is to make the store one of the best and most modern in the state and will not stop at expense in doing so. The location of the new store will be 107 Washington street and will be open about May first.

Allendale Farm Receives Bequest

The Allendale farm, known as one of the most complete and beneficial school for boys in the U. S. and situated in this county, was last week named as one of several to receive bequests from the late Geo. W. Hale, wealthy Chicagoan. 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
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
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
