CIVIL SERVICE WANTS CANDIDATES

Married Couples Seen Preferable Examinations are not Very Difficult but Require a Good School Education

The Civil Service Commission wants to secure good candidates for the position of inspectors of institutions paying from \$75 to \$125 per month. Housefather and housemother, paying from \$75 to \$100 per month for couples, with full maintenance. From \$25 a month and up with full maintenance for single employees. They particularly need married couples to take charge of the cottages at St. Charles School for Boys. Examinations which require a good school education are to be held February sixth under the Civil Service Commission. All applications must be on file in Springfield before five p. m. Saturday, January 30. For any further information the candidates should communicate with the Civil Service Commission, Springfield, Ill.

FAR-REACHING WORK OF CLUB WOMEN

A Fresh Bit of News of the General Federation of Women's Clubs

The Federation's Department of Conservation has recently added to its interests the conservation of natural scenery and the development of our National Parks, in the belief that natural scenery is one of our country's most ennobling resources. Led by the chairman of its Conservation Department, Mrs. John D. Sherman of Chicago, the Federation has worked for the creation of the Rocky Mountain National Park. A few weeks ago, Mrs. Sherman was in Washington and was asked to speak before the committee of Congress which then had before it the Rocky Mountain Park Bill.

The Senate had already passed the bill but opposition was feared in the House. Mrs. Sherman was obliged to decline, as she was to leave Washington before the day set for the hearing. She then was asked if she would speak if a special hearing were given. She consented gladly the committee was called together, she made her speech for she was well qualified to present the case, and the bill was voted out of committee with a unanimous recommendation.

This is the bill which passed the House on Monday of this week creating a National Park of approximately 650 square miles, which includes canyons, mountain lakes, valleys, and mountain parks. Americans have been spending \$500,000,000 annually abroad, one of the main attractions being scenery; and this is an opportune time to conserve the primitive scenic beauty of our own country and prepare it for the enjoyment of the people.
