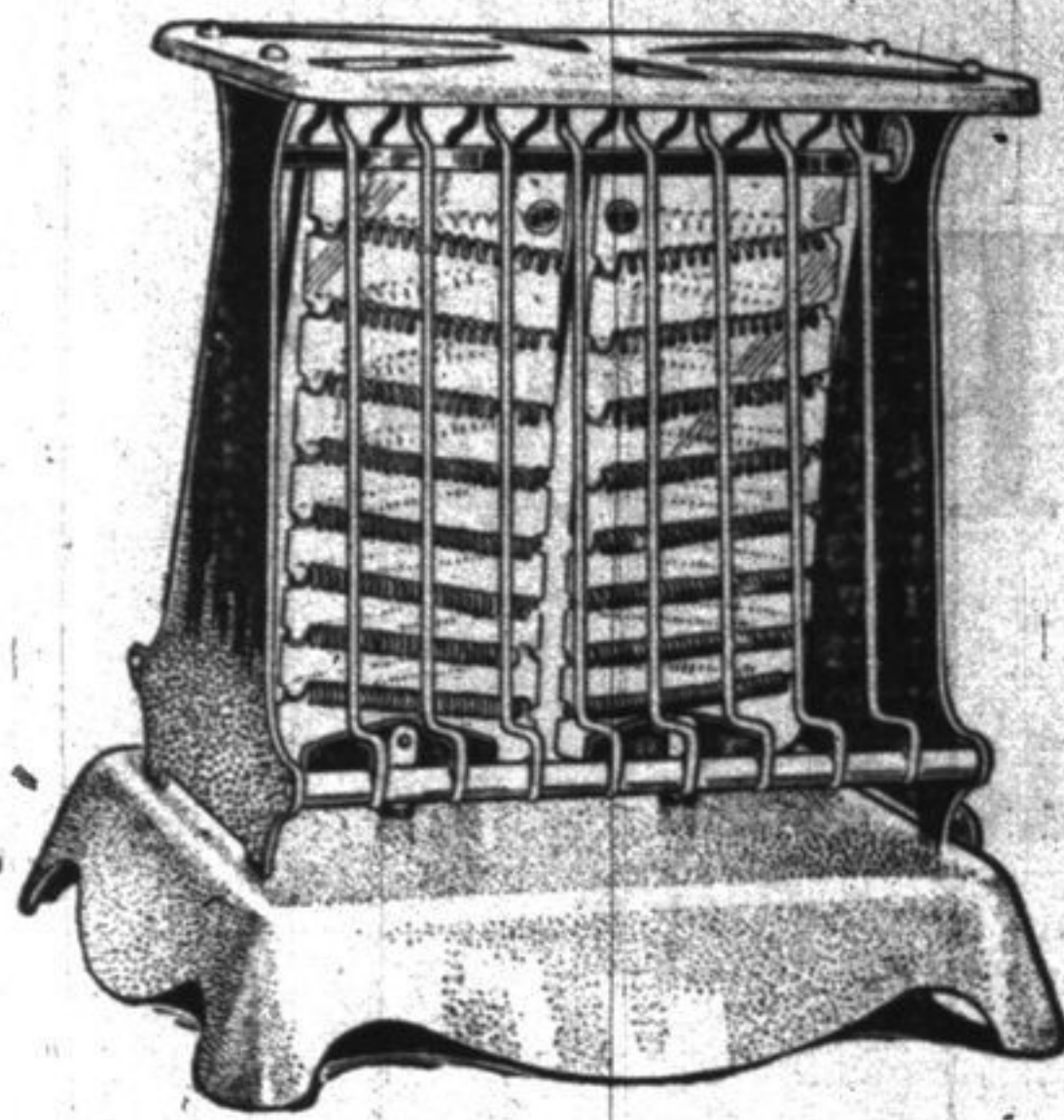

ELMENDORF IN THE GARDEN OF ALLAH

At Orchestra Hall Sunday Afternoon,
Jan. 24th. Next Week Travel Will
be Through Northern
Europe

At Orchestra Hall on Sunday afternoon, Dwight Elmendorf, the artist and traveler, will present his illustrated travel talk, "The Garden of Allah." The starting point of this fascinating tour will be Tunis, a bit of the Orient set down close to the shores of Europe. After a stroll about its crooked streets, past well stocked bazaars and beautiful Mosques, Mr. Elmendorf will conduct his hearers on an eight weeks' caravan journey directly across the great desert of Sahara.

The first point of interest will be El Djem, where we find a wonderful Roman amphitheatre, thence to Kerouan, a Moslem shrine even more oriental than Cairo. Then to Thama-gudi, the Algerian Pompeii and through the marvelous gorge of El Kantara to the Oasis of Sidi Okba before the journey is ended at the famous oasis of Biskra—the locale of Hichens' wonderful book, "The Garden of Allah." Continuing his travels on Wednesday and Friday evenings and Saturday afternoon of next week, Mr. Elmendorf will picture and describe a circular tour in "Northern Europe."

STUDENTS BUILDING WAR CARS

Northwestern Cadets at Work on Ten
Automobiles for use by Army

Ten military automobiles are being constructed by the students of the Northwestern Military and Naval academy at Lake Geneva, Wis., and some time in June or July this motorcade will be driven from Chicago to the Pacific coast for the purpose of demonstrating to the government the utility of this type of gasoline propelled vehicles. Officers from the United States army will accompany the students and altogether it will be a most important tour.

R. P. Davidson, colonel and superintendent of the academy at Lake Geneva, which moved there from Highland Park, is the man responsible for the idea. The colonel long has been an ardent supporter of the automobile and it will be remembered that in the strenuous Glidden tour of 1910, the year it went down through Texas, and which really was the last competition for the trophy, there were two cars representing the Northwestern academy. They were equipped for military work and manned by students.

PERSIAN GULF PEARLS.

The Divers Are Practically Slaves of the Boat Masters.

Bombay, noted for its pearl markets, is not a pearl producer, though the gems are bought there for shipment to all parts of the world. The pearls sold in Bombay come from the Bahrein Islands, a small archipelago on the western side of the Persian gulf, which, although adjacent to territory under the control of Turkey, is governed by an independent sheik under special British protection, the British government maintaining a political agent there.

Of this group of islands only those of Bahrein and Maharak are of any size. Their importance, however, is out of all proportion to their extent, for they are the great center of the Persian gulf pearl fisheries, which are the world's chief source of supply for pearls. The sheik of Bahrein is said to have a customs revenue amounting to about \$400,000 per year, which makes him the richest ruler in the Persian gulf. The pearl fisheries under his control may in a good year bring to his islands as much as \$2,500,000.

It is difficult for newcomers to obtain the services of good divers owing to the system in vogue, which practically makes this class of men slaves to the masters of the pearling boats. The men's earnings in the majority of cases are insufficient to keep them all the year round, and consequently they take advances from their masters year after year to such an extent that they can never repay their debt. When a diver elects to engage himself to another boat the owner of the latter has to pay up the debt due to the former master should he engage him.—Argonaut.
