The second of Miss Carver's series of illustrated talks on Romanticism in music was given on Tuesday morning at the home of Mrs. George R. Jones, 308 Vine Ave. Chronologically the second great romantic composer was Franz Schubert, known best to the world at large through his remarkable "unfinished" symphony. Schubert deserves to live chiefly, however, through his lavish gift of pure German songs which created and gave impetus to that marvelous succession of song writers whose songs make up the German "lid"—a treasure house of melody and poetry. Like many other genius Schubert was unrecognized in his day. He died prematurely, in poverty, at the age of thirty-one, while still at the height of his musical fruition. Next Tuesday Miss Carver's talk will be on Schumann, the poet composer. Illustrating the lecture, the following program of Schumann's compositions will be given: Fantaisie, opus 17 (first movement); songs, Des Abends, Aufschwung, Warum, and Grillen, opus 12.
