Letter From Chas. M. Thomson. Seed Requests and Seeds Will be Forwarded

The Department of Agriculture is making a limited distribution of new field seeds authorized in a recent Act passed by Congress, and is anxious to place the seed in the hands of farmers who may be interested in it and who will give it careful attention and report to the department the results that may obtain, in using it.

There is available for use in Lake County, Illinois the following seed: Sudan grass, Kansas alfalfa, soy beans, cow peas.

I will be very glad to receive the names and addresses of any of the farmers of the county who may be interested in testing out one or more of these crops, and upon receiving requests for either one or more kinds of these seeds I shall be glad to arrange with the department to have a supply forwarded.
