

Continued from First Page public the names of their financial back ers, amounting to an admission that if there is such a thing as a water power trust in the United States, it is a mem ber of it.

The Report of the Board of Engineers on this project was contained in House Document 20, a copy of which Mr. Lenroot used in making his argument. Mr. Lenroot called attention to the strange dearth of this document. He said he believed members would find it imposs ble to secure a copy.

In his remarks in defense of the project, Mr. Taylor contended that no effort had been made to create a famine in the supply of Document 20, and that he ha even gone so far as to mail one to Mr Gifford Pinchot, President of the National Conservation Association, and that even he had not found any fault with the scheme involved in the project.
