

A new spirit is coming. Because of the absense of any issue back of this objectless war, we wonder why these terrible blunders that brought on this war were made. We must find out what we stand for and how we think. The need has arisen to find out how others think, that this war may be the last. Revoltionize the school books, and begin in the pragmatic way to teach from the pulpit and the press that other nation
