DO YOU WANT A FARM?

Uncle Sam is Looking for Practical Farmers to Take up Homes in the West

Uncle Sam is looking for several hundred practical farmers to take up homes on the irrigation projects he has been building in the west. The land is free, but the law requires settlers to pay their share of building the irrigation system, and for this reason a moderate capital is necessary. A practical farmer with from \$1,500 to \$3,000 should have no trouble in acquiring one of these farms and putting it in successful cultivation.

Under the new Extension act the settlers are allowed twenty years in which to pay for their water right, and no interest is required on deferred payments. Details concerning opportunities and terms will be furnished upon request by the Statistician of the Reclamation Service, Washington, D. C.

The farms are located in Idaho, Montana, South Dakota, Nebraska, Wyoming, and Nevada, and offer opportunities for citizens to establish homes in a growing country. Adjacent farms are under cultivation, railroads have been built, schools and churches established, telephone and rural free delivery are available, and most of the hardships of pioneering already have been overcome.

Alfalfa is the big crop, although grain, and sugar beets are profitable and in some sections truck farming pays well. Live stock and dairying are the principal industries.



400-FOOT STEEL TOWER COMPLETED

Third Largest Tower in the World at Great Lakes Naval Training Station

There has just been completed at the United States Naval Training Station in North Chicago, Ill., one of the two 400-foot steel towers forming a part of the high-powered radio station now under construction at that place. This structure enjoys the unique distinction of being one of the three highest towers in the world, the others being the Eiffel Tower at Paris, France, and the 600-foot tower of the radio station at Arlington, Va., maintained by the Navy Department.

When completed the radio station at Great Lakes will be one of the most important of its kind in the world. It will establish wireless communications with the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, Alaska, and the Panama Canal Zone, and will be of immeasurable value not only in a military way, but to marine and commercial interests as well. It is anticipated that it will also be of particular value in cases of storm or flood when the regular telegraph and telephone services may be useless.
