ALD: OBEE OBJECTS TO C. & M. E. RATE RAISE

terney to Take Matter up With Public Utilities Commission at Once

"Section twelve of an ordinance granted the Bluff City Electric Railway fixes rates of fare within the corporate limits of Highland Park at five cents. Highland Park to Chicago & Northwestern Railway depot at Fort Sheridan at five cents. To Lake Forest ten cents and twenty-five ride ticket unlimited to Lake Forest at \$2.00 each. Cash fare to Waukegan twenty cents, round trip thirty cents." Under the new rate to go in effect April

Twenty-five coupon tickets between be sold for \$4.60 each making the round trip fare cost thirty-seven or seven cents advance per round trip over the price now charged.

A great many people living in Highland Park that work in Waukegan and North Chicago will be effected by the raise in fare and have requested Ald. Obee to prevent the raise in rates if it is possible to do so. Mr. Obee has promised to take the matter up with the city attorney and see what can be done.

Ald. Obee asserts that the Chicago & Miiwaukee Electric Railroad Company will be unable to advance the rates until after their present franchise expires.
