### Highland Park Woman's Club

The last regular meeting of the Highland Park Woman's Club was held in the lecture room of the Presbyterian Church on Tuesday afternoon, April 6th. The program opened with some songs by negro composers "Just You", T. C. Burleigh, a baritone in one of New York's largest churches, and "A Summer Idyll," Coleridge-Taylor, very beautifully sung and interpreted by Mrs. Carleton M. Vail accompanied by Miss Priscilla Carver. Mrs. Celia Parker Woolley head resident of the Frederick Douglass Centre then told of the need of such a centre, as a meeting place for both white and black people, that they may have a better understanding of one another. Just as the social settlement is the meeting place for employer and employee, the rich and poor, capital and labor, that they may, at least, mitigate economic and other understandings, all human; so this settlement, with the one difference, the racial prejudice for the ex-slave.

This is a white problem as well as a black. We tell the negro to take care of himself, yet all the business colleges in Chicago are closed to him. We feel grieved, if he comes to our church, or place of amusement. Yet notwithstanding the injustice done the negro people illiteracy has been reduced 60% since slavery. In Chicago alone there are 30 or 40 women's clubs which belong to a National Federation of which Mrs. Booker T. Washington is President; three or four colored newspapers, several churches drug stores, hundreds of professional people and so on.

It was easier to sign the Emancipation Proclamation than to work out real freedom by long and painful adjustment. Are we going to be truly American and democratic, and allow the negro freedom to select the schools to which he wants to send his children; allow him to live where he can afford; go where he wants; or are we going to forget our republican training, pass prohibitory laws, "Thus far shalt thou go and no farther?" This motto we may take unto ourselves, which Mrs. Woolley has hanging on the walls of the Centre "I am resolved that no man shall drag me down by making me hate him".

The program ended with two more songs, "She rested by the Broken Brook" Coleridge-Taylor and "Awakening" by Rosamunde Johnson, again showing that the musical ability of the negro is equal to that of the white man. Refreshments were served by the following hostesses; Mrs. Clarence H. Thayer chairman assisted by Mesdames Charles P. Jaeger, H. P. Jeppesen, O. A. Leonard, W. M. Lovell, John Schreurs, F. X.
