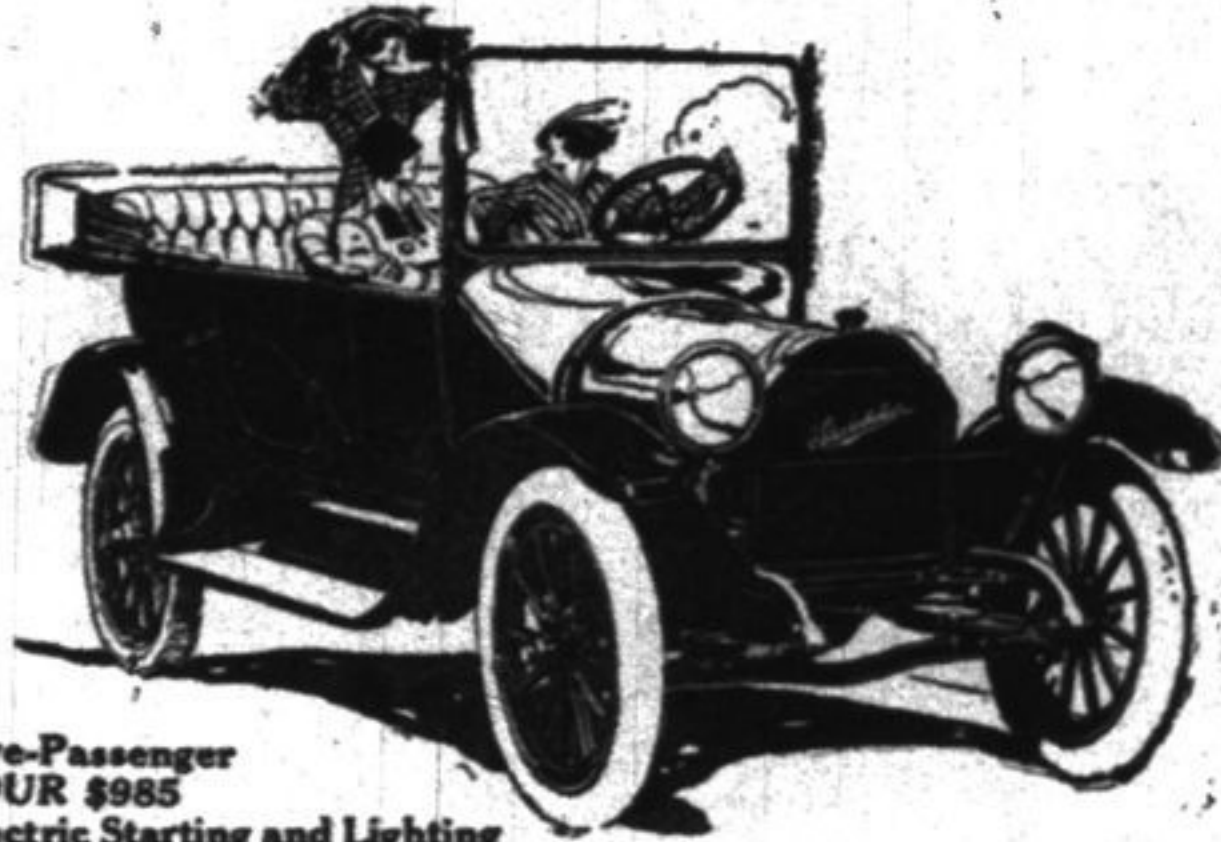

Banks Consolidate
Arrangements for the consolidation of the First National bank of Lake Forest and the State Bank of Lake Forest were completed last week. The new institution began business on April 1 with more than \$1,000,000 in deposits and \$130,000 capital and surplus. Its officers are P. L. James, president; Frank Read, cashier; and George Anderson and George Findlay, vice presidents. Among the directors are: Robert Thorne, James O. Heyward, Frank T. Pirie, L. F. Swift, A. Russell, E. F. Carey and C. L. Kraft.

Ice House Burns at Fox Lake
The 90,000 ton ice house of the Nelson-Morris Packing company located in village of Fox Lake, on Pistakee lake at what is called Scott's landing, burned. The estimated loss is \$200,000 to the packing company on the ice house property; the packing company and some of the railroads also stand a big loss by the destruction of eight empty freight cars which stood in the yards ready to be filled. As a freight car is valued at something over \$2,500, it is seen that the loss on the cars will be about \$20,000, which, added to the \$200,000, makes the total loss, something like \$220,000. The ice house, was one of the largest on the chain of lakes, and had about the following dimensions: 600 feet long, 200 feet wide, 40 feet wide, 12 rooms in the house, capacity 90,000 tons.
