## REGULARS WIN FIRST GAME OF THE SEASON

### HOME PLAYERS SHOW LOTS OF SPEED

Final Score 4 to 5. Duffy Makes Noteworthy Catch Which Saved two Runs. Will Play the "Pep-low A. C." Sunday

The Regulars opened the 1915 baseball season Sunday at Central Park by defeating the speedy "Fritzi Scheffs" of Chicago in a fast played game by a score of 3 to 4. The day was almost perfect and the 600 fans who attended, went home well pleased with the article of ball displayed by both teams. The home team showed lots of speed in all departments of the game, but the most noteworthy was the catch of Duffy, who ran back on a fly ball about 50 yards and pulled it down with one hit and saved two runs. The hitting of O'Farrel and Sullivan for the Regulars were features.

The visitors got away with three runs in the first inning, while the Regulars came back in their half with two. In the fourth inning the Regulars took the lead by scoring two more runs, making the score 4 to 3 in their favor. There was no more scoring until the ninth inning when the visitors tied the score. Not to be outdone, the Regulars came to bat in their last inning and O'Farrel singled, stole second and was sacrificed to third by Glader, from where he scored on an infield single by Sullivan. ## OSSOLI CLUB HAS A VERY SUCCESSFUL YEAR

### DOES MUCH IN PHILANTHROPY WORK

Largest Sum of Money Expended was \$894 for Bathing Beach. Twelve Charitable Societies Helped With Donations

The last regular meeting of the Ossoli Club was held in the Highland Park Club House Thursday, April fifteenth. Luncheon was served at 12:30 p. m. after which the annual meeting was held, Mrs. Rex L. Jones presiding. The reports of the officers and chairmen of the committees showed a year of splendid activity. Perhaps the most interesting of all was the report of the treasurer which showed the large sum of money disbursed for philanthropic purposes. The total receipts for the year were \$2424 and of this only \$396 were used for the current expenses of the Ossoli and yet 11 excellent programs and 11 study classes were given during the year. The largest sum expended was \$894 which was for the maintenance of the bathing beach. About 20,000 people enjoyed the privileges of the beach during the summer. Other organizations to which money and personal work were contributed were Lake Bluff Orphanage, University of Chicago Settlement, Chicago Commons, Art League of Highland Park, Father Francis of Waukegan, United Charities of Chicago, Relief and Aid of Highland Park, Visiting Nurse Association of Highland Park, Woman's Trade Union League, Vocational schools, Park Ridge school, Red Cross work. By the revision of the by-laws three departments were formed, Art and Literature, Civics and Philanthropy, Home and Education. It was with deep regret that the club accepted the retirement of Mrs. Rex L. Jones as president, but feels it is very fortunate in having such an able successor in Mrs. Otis L. Beardsley. The other officers elected were Mrs. Marshall Sampson, vice president; Miss Catherine Cushing, recording secretary; Miss Jessie Chandler, corresponding secretary; Mrs. John Tuttle, Mrs. Alex. Carqueville, Miss Marion Mason, Mrs. Earl Spencer, Mrs. Herman Thomas, directors; Mrs. Henry Vail, chairman of the Art and Literature departments; Mrs. William Fyffe, chairman of the Civics and Philanthropy departments; Mrs. Bowen Schumacher, chairman of the Home and Education departments.

At the First United Evangelical Church, Beginning Sunday, April 25th, and Continuing Over Sunday, May 16th

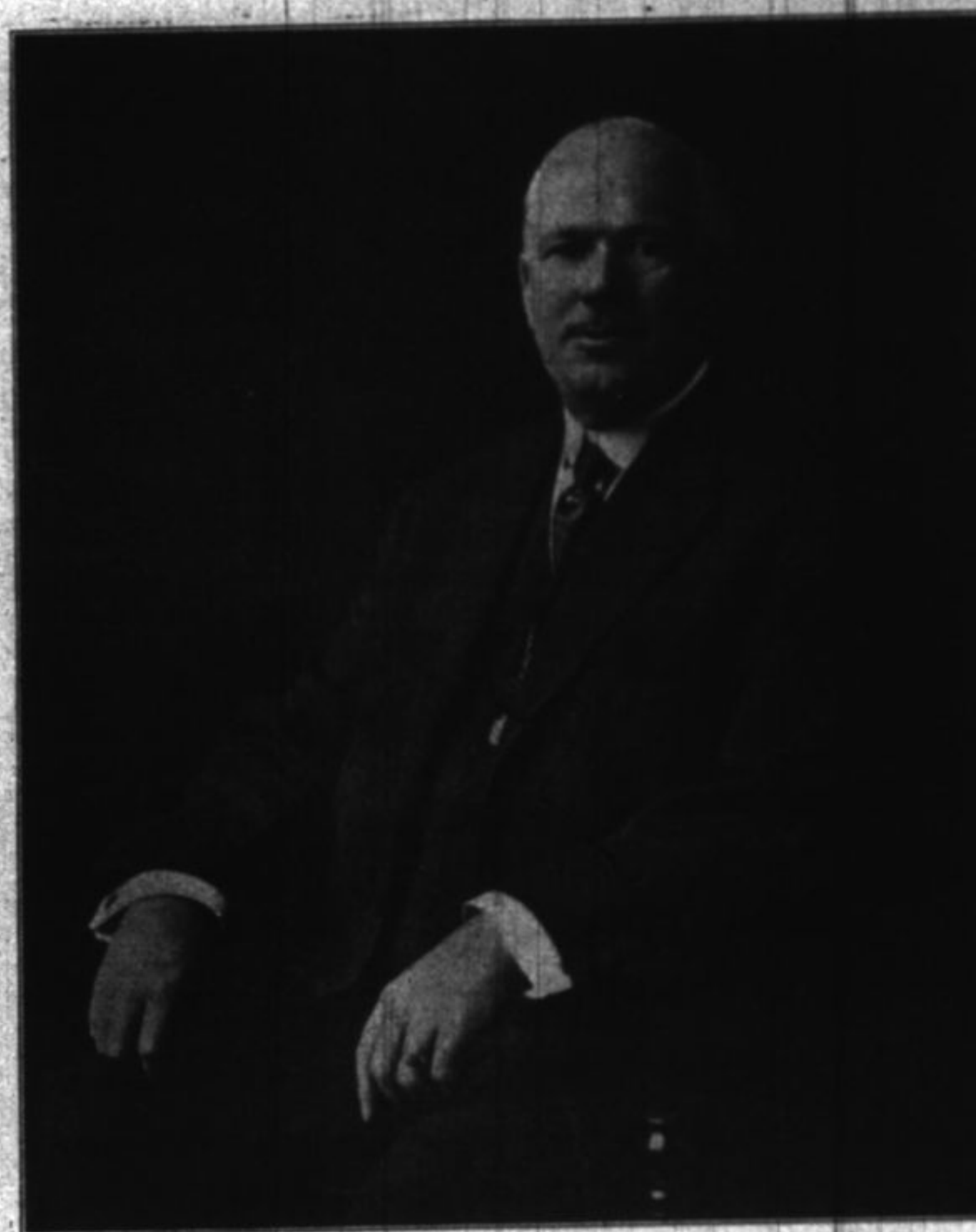

### A Message from our New Mayor

FELLOW CITIZENS:

If this means the birth of new and better things for Highland Park—if this means that the citizens of Highland Park are united in one grand and determined endeavor for the common wealth of this community then I am indeed glad, and most fortunate, to have been called to your leadership.

Before we visualize the future, let us pause for just a moment and pay tribute to the splendid leadership of that Grand Old Man, who has just relinquished the office of mayor. I speak now of our beloved friend and neighbor, ex-Mayor Hawkins. If there is one regret in passing from the old into the new, it is the regret that this gentleman has retired. But I feel that I am wise in asking, and am in accepting, his wise counsel and his hearty co-operation in all things that spell advancement and achievement for our fair city under its new system of government.

The retirement at this time of the officers of the old city council, gives me this opportunity to thank them in behalf of our citizens for their untiring efforts in the performance of their duty. They have done much for our city, nor shall their effort fail in fruition if I am given the power and wisdom to direct their successors in a manner that I trust will develop broader and greater things, through a concentrated and harmonious effort, under a modernized and non-partisan system of municipal government, evoking the greatest good to the greatest number, in the simplest possible method of business management.

Their selection, and their acceptance of this trust, is the strongest guarantee that they have entered upon this task with the fullest appreciation of its seriousness, and their word and promise is as good as a recorded deed.

I realize we have but started on a new era of betterment, but I know that all things are possible when there is team work, and speaking for myself, I can assure you as captain of this team, we are going to try to keep the pennant of good government where we have nailed it, and use *betide* the backsliders.

The recent election is exceedingly gratifying to your new officers, because of the large vote polled, showing the interest of the entire citizenship in the new form of government. We are particularly gratified at the interest taken in the election by the women of our city and the large vote cast by them. This argues well for the future.

As Mayor of your city, I hereby declare and proclaim that this "Government of the People, for the People, and by the People," must have its rewards to each of us now, and all of you henceforth, in this and future generations.

## SAMUEL M. HASTINGS ELECTED MAYOR OF HIGHLAND PARK

1721 VOTES CAST. WOMEN CAST 780 AND MEN 941

Largest Vote in the History of City Elects Edward G. Huber, Howard H. Hitchcock, Fritz Bahr and Ward W. Willis First Commissioners of Highland Park

One of the most enthusiastic elections in the history of Highland Park is over. It marks the beginning of the Commission Form of Government for this city. The men elected have a live interest in Highland Park. They are all successful business men, men of ability and integrity. Their work will be arduous in behalf of the community. They will need the cooperation of its citizens. Let us forget the differences and get together for a new Highland Park under a new form of government. Forget the railroad track and the ward lines, we'll all feel better.

The newly elected officers are: For Mayor, Samuel M. Hastings; for commissioners, Fritz Bahr, Howard H. Hitchcock, Edward G. Huber and Ward W. Willis. Their first meeting will be held in the city hall next Monday evening.

There were 1721 votes cast, the largest ever recorded in Highland Park, of these votes 780 were by women and 941 by men. Following is the vote by wards:

## PEARCE ELECTED MAYOR OF WAUKEGAN

Powell, Swayer, Dietmeyer and Orvis Elected Commissioners

W. W. ## SATURDAY'S SCHOOL ELECTION

No Opposition in District 107. Large Vote Cast in District 108.

In school district No. 107, there were only 52 votes cast, there being no opposition to Mr. E. B. Metzger for president and Mrs. Everett Millard and Mr. S. A. St. Peter for members of the board. Each candidate received 52 votes.

In district No. 108 one of the largest votes in history was cast, a total of 345. Mr. C. N. Kimball was re-elected president by a vote of 307. Mrs. Ralph Seymour and Mr. R. S. Kirchberger were re-elected members of the board, the former receiving 249 votes and the latter 288. Mr. Frank R. Cain, who was an independent candidate and did not file a petition, received 72 votes.

In district No. 111, Mr. O. S. Gooch defeated Mr. James Hepburn for member of the board by two votes. Mr. Gooch received 107 and Mr. Hepburn 105.
