 Mr. George W. Goodall, aged forty-seven years, died very suddenly after a few days' illness of heart trouble, at the Evanston hospital, Saturday noon. Mr. Goodall was well known here, having lived in or near Highland Park since the time he left England twenty years ago. Just previous to his death he was the Highwood agent for the Chicago and Milwaukee Electric Railroad. **GOLDEN JUBILEE OF REV. E. J. VATTMANN**

**CELEBRATE 50TH YEAR OF ORDINATION**

Was Former Chaplain at Fort Sheridan. Very Well Known and Much Thought of in This Community

This evening Thursday, May 13th, Ascension Day, the citizens of Wilmette will honor the very Rev. Edward J. Vattmann of Wilmette former Chaplain at Fort Sheridan who will celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. Father Vattmann will read Mass at ten o'clock and will wear a vestment made of magnificent gold cloth, the cloth of which was presented him many years ago, by the Emperor of China. The vestment was made by the Madames of Sacred Heart. The cloth is valued from fifty to sixty dollars a yard. For thirty years, Father Vattmann has been a major chaplain in the U. S. army, and had the personal respect, confidence and admiration of Presidents McKinley, Roosevelt and Taft.

The scope of Father Vattmann's work was far wider than the routine of a military chaplain. History will show what an important part he played in reconciling the Filipinos and Porto Ricans to American rule. His own church owes him a rare debt of gratitude and the expectation of his friends that a token of this would be forth coming at the festivities of his jubilee has been realized in his appointment as Monsignor.

Father Vattmann's sympathies were never confined to those of his own faith. His closest and dearest friends are outside of the catholic church. The village of Wilmette knows him for a public minded citizen. On the park board and on the school board he has given of his time and energy. He is a member of Marquette Council of Knights of Columbus.

The Knights of Columbus are entertaining with a banquet the evening in St. Joseph's Church. The banquet hall will be decorated in colors of purple and gold. All members and friends are invited to participate.
