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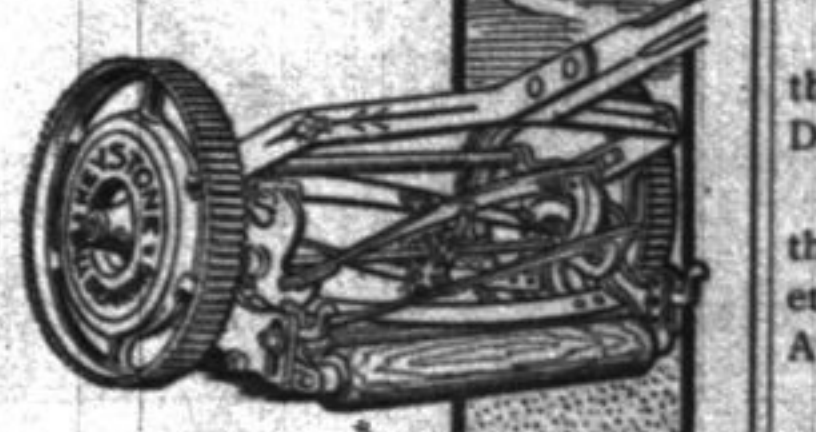
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LOCAL AND PERSONAL NEWS

Elm Place School Notes

Each of the two gable fronts of the Elm Place Annex has last week received its final decoration in the form of a copy in terra cotta of one of the bambinoes which were executed by Andrea della Robbia in 1463 for the front of the Foundlings' Hospital at Florence. The terra cotta pieces replace the stone medallions which were set into the front of the building at first. The American Terra Cotta Company of Crystal Lake, manufacturers of Teco ware, were given the contract for the work. The copies were modeled expressly for the Annex by Carl Schneider and were enameled in the colors of the originals, the background being a cloudy blue against which the child forms stand out in high relief. These figures make a most appropriate and artistic decoration for the front of a building where child nurture is the theme, the purpose for which it was erected.
