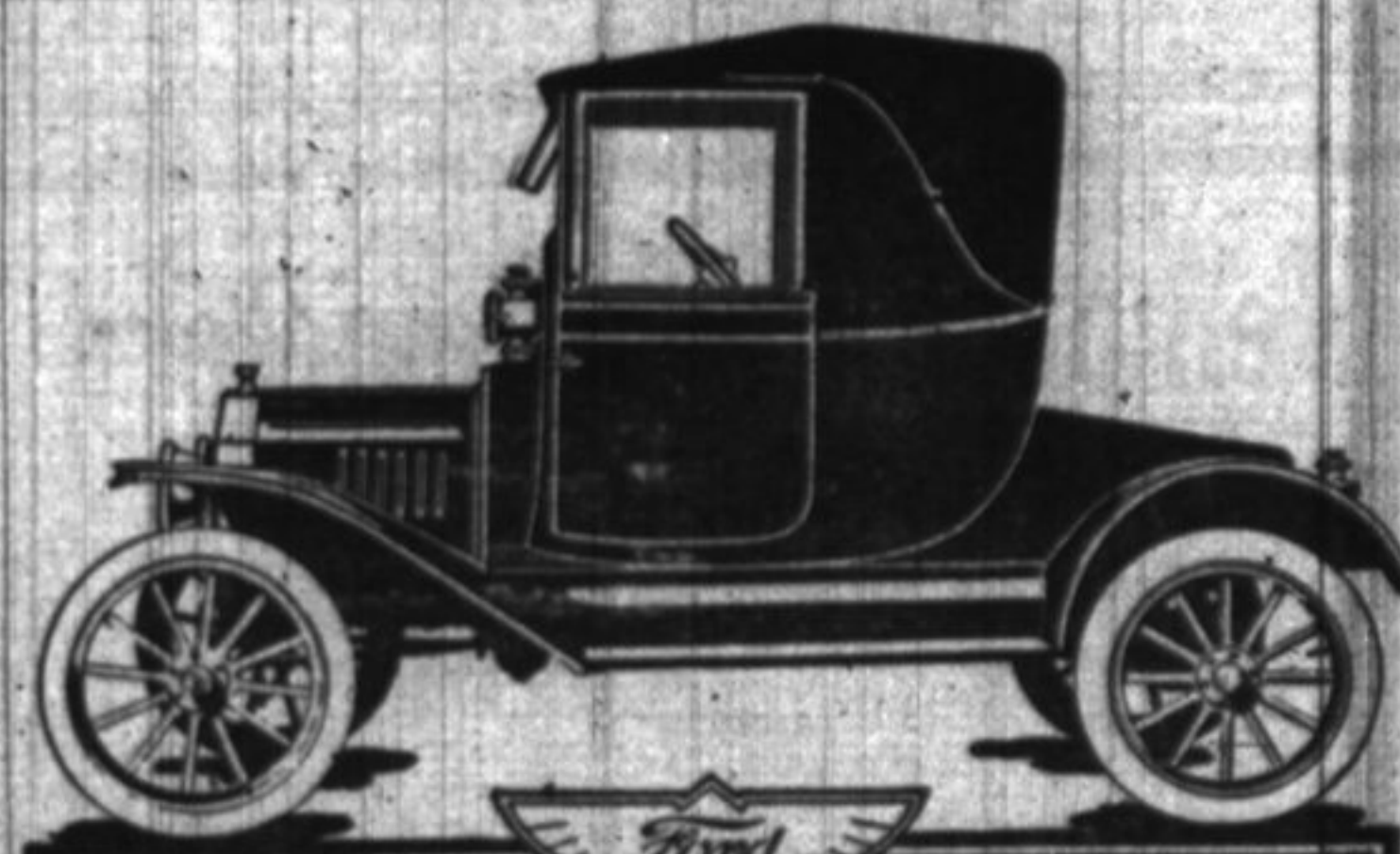
Miss Hilda Nelson gave a party for her friends in the Association headquarters Friday evening, which was greatly enjoyed by all present.
