

YOUR TREES



Have you noticed disfigured foliage on your Oaks, Elms and Maples? It means that the trees are either effected by Blight, Fungus, Bugs or Caterpillars and that they should be sprayed. There is a beautiful Hedge of Native Thorns along the Moraine Hotel Grounds. The Plants were infested with Scale for years until we arrived with our spraying outfit and one dose of Fungine cleaned the Hedge and put new life into the Plants. We have done the same thing for a whole lot of others and would be glad to demonstrate to you that proper spraying is essentially necessary to keep the Grounds clear and the Trees in a healthy condition.



True, years ago no one thought of spraying and they got along nicely, but for all that thousands of trees perished each year and are still perishing on account of Scale and Insect Pests and the more stock we import and introduce here the more Scale and Insects we import and spread with them. Why are we so particular about keeping disease away from human beings? Why do we pay so much attention to our sanitary conditions? Why do we worry about a leper in our midst? Almost anybody can answer those questions, yet it is hard for some to make up their minds that a tree, in order to do well and carry its beautiful foliage all through the summer, should be properly taken care of, should be pruned, sprayed and fertilized. We are here to do all

this, have men who don't do anything else. We would like to talk to you about it, that is if you are at all anxious to have good trees, if not you don't want us. LESS TREES BUT BETTER ONES is what our town needs, not old scrubs of oaks, dried up tops, poles with a few branches on the very tip, there is no more beautiful tree than the oak, no matter what sort of oak, but it must have attention. The more you clean up around the native Trees, the more paved streets and sewers and the more drives and walks you build on your grounds and the oftener you cut the lawn, the more attention the native trees should have in order to hold their own, to develop and grow into beautiful specimens. Notice is hereby given that bids will be received for the grading, draining, curbing, paving with macadam, roadway having a bituminous macadam surface (eighteen (18) feet wide including concrete gutters), constructing a reinforced concrete girder-type bridge, and otherwise improving Beech St. from the easterly line of the paved roadway in St. Johns Ave., easterly to the westerly line of Sheridan Rd. (excepting the site of the concrete bridge her-in provided for); St. Johns Ave. from the southerly line of Lincoln Ave. produced westerly across St. Johns Ave., and southerly to the southerly line of Beech St. produced westerly across St. Johns Ave.; Forest Ave. from the southerly line of Wade St. produced westerly, southerly to the easterly line of the paved roadway in St. Johns Ave., herein provided, Linden Ave. from the easterly line of Forest Ave., southerly to the southerly line of Beech St.; and constructing a reinforced concrete bridge in Beech St. between Wade St. and Linden Ave. spanning the ravine in Beech St. all in the city of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, as a whole in accordance with the ordinance therefor. Said bids will be opened on the 2nd day of July A. D. 1915, at the hour of 4:45 o'clock p. m., at the office of the Board of Local Improvements in the city hall of the city of Highland Park.

The specifications and blank proposals will be furnished by the office of the Board of Local Improvements in the city hall in said city.

The contractor will be paid in bonds, which bonds will draw interest at the rate of five per cent per annum.

All proposals or bids must be accompanied by a certified check payable to the president of the Board of Local Improvements of the city of Highland Park for the sum of not less than ten (10) per cent of the aggregate of the proposal.

Said proposal must be delivered to the president of the Board of Local Improvements in open session of said Board at the time and place fixed herein for the opening of the same. No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by check as herein provided.

PROPOSAL
Road Work in Town of East Deerfield

Proposals will be received for the improvement of about one-half (1/2) mile of Green Bay Road, one mile of the Deerfield Road in the Town of East Deerfield, Lake County, Illinois.

Green Bay Road: Proposals will be received for the construction of a concrete road eighteen (18) feet in width in Green Bay Road, south of the city limits of Highland Park. Alternate proposals also will be received for re-surfacing said road with an asphalt macadam surface 2" thick.

Proposals also will be received for re-surfacing the Deerfield Road from the west limits of Highland Park, westerly, for a distance of about one mile to the west limits of the town.

Proposals will be received up to the hour of 9 a. m., June 21, 1915, at the office of the Town Clerk of East Deerfield.

Plans and specifications can be seen on file at his office and at the office of the County Superintendent of Highways, Waukegan, Illinois.

Certified check of two hundred (\$200.00) dollars will be required with bids for each road.
