LAW ADVISERS TO AID WILSON

International Committee is Urged for Use in Crisis by S. M. Hastings.
 S. M. Hastings, president of the Illinois Manufacturers' association, advocates a committee of international law advisers for the United States in a statement issued Sunday. He believes President Wilson would be relieved of much pressure if business and professional men would suggest a committee composed of such men as John Bassett Moore and former Senator Elihu Root.
 With their knowledge and experience in international law and diplomacy, Mr. Hastings is confident that by acting in conjunction with Secretary of State Lansing and similar committees representing the belligerent countries they might dispose of many details of international questions without the necessity of imposing this burden on the president.
 "If I am permitted to make a suggestion," said Mr. Hastings "it would be that instead of the diplomatic departments of the nations endeavoring to handle their intricate questions, why not have each nation at war select three of its ablest men and each neutral country select three of its best representatives, and let them handle the question involved in international law and the so-called violations of the same.
 "I believe such a plan as suggested above if earnestly and conscientiously followed might lead to peace quicker than any other method. At least it would help relieve our president and the principals of the other nations of their great responsibilities".—Chicago Tribune.

 the total amount of interest on improvement bonds due in 1915 to be \$9,429.18, of this amount \$7,239.43 is due July 1st and the balance of \$2,089.76, September 15th.
 The total amount of cash to the credit of the interest-funds that can be applied toward the payment of interest due July 1st is \$1,972.25, leaving a deficit of \$5,367.18.
 In order to pay all the interest on improvement bonds due July 1st, 1915, it will be necessary to borrow, temporarily, from our current funds. There is \$9,464.14 to the credit of the bridge fund, which amount will not be required for immediate use on bridges. I recommend that \$5,367.18 be borrowed from the bridge fund. Said amount to be distributed to the interest account of the various special assessments in which there are shortages. I would further recommend that an anticipatory warrant for the sum of \$5,367.18 with interest at 5% be placed to the credit of the bridge fund as security for said loan.
 No provision should be made for deficit in interest on bonds due September 15th, at this time.

REPORT OF WATER ANALYSIS

Of High School Natatorium After Three Weeks Daily use Without Changing
 After three weeks daily use without changing the water other than by filtering, the analysis of water in the township high school swimming tank shows the water safe.
 Here is a report made by the chemist of the Evanston Board of Health: Sample Highland Park High School Swimming Tank.

 Total Bact. per cc on L. L. A. 2 days 37.5 C.; 4,000.
 Total Bact. per cc on N. A. 4 days 20 C.; 14,000.
 Red Colonies per cc on L. L. A. 2 days 37.5 C.; 0.
 Gas producers in 10 cc, L. All other tubes showed turbidity.
 The fairly low total bacterial count the absence of red colonies and the one gas producer in 10cc, show this sample to be safe considering the fact that the tank has been used for over a half a day between the last sterilization and the taking of the sample.
