Antioch to have High School

One hundred and seventy-five voters of Antioch went to the polls last week Tuesday and registered their vote in favor of a township high school. Three questions were placed before the people at the election. Whether or not bonds should be issued for the purpose of having the school, whether a building should be erected and the choosing of a site for the structure. The following results on these questions were totaled last night after the polls were closed:

Favoring bonds	175
Against bonds	29
Favoring building	181
Against building	28

Eleven blank ballots were cast in the first proposition and seven in the second. The question of a site for the school proved to be one over which there was considerable rivalry. The nearly unanimous sentiment for the bonds and building split up when it came to choosing the site. As a result the question of the selection of a site automatically falls to the township school trustees and the county superintendent for settlement.
