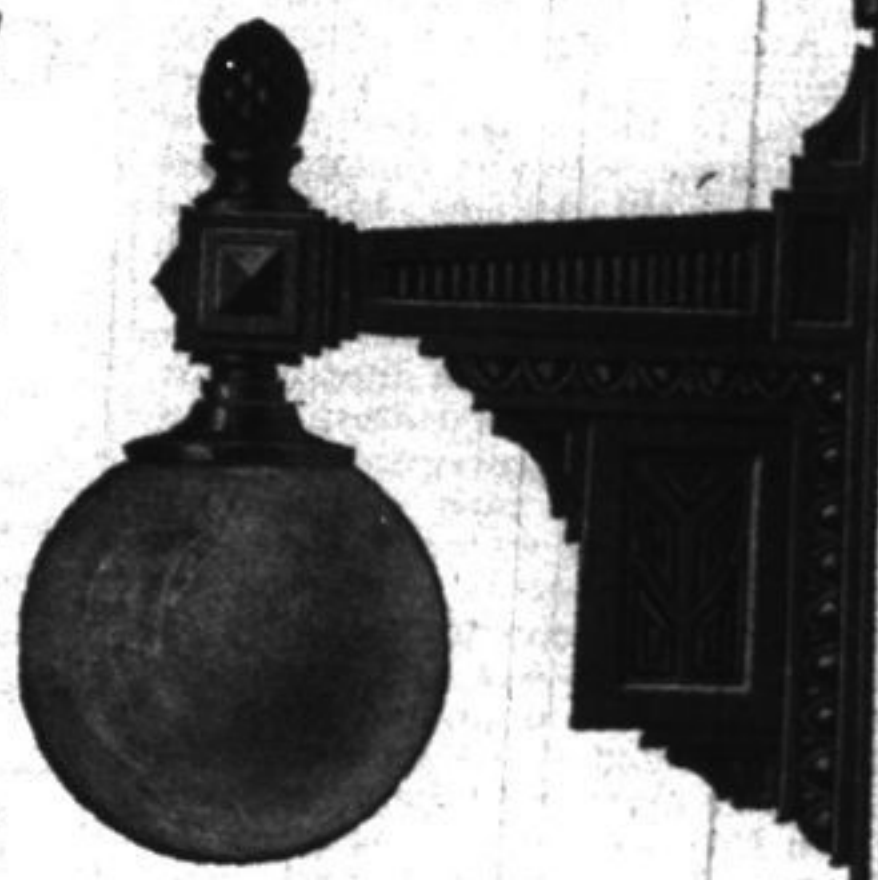

ANNUAL CONVENTION PROVES A SUCCESS

ELECT OFFICERS FOR ENSUING YEAR

Eight Sunday Schools in County Represented. Complete Report of Convention a Year Ago Was Read

The annual convention of the Deerfield Township Sunday School Association was held in the Presbyterian Church Sunday afternoon. Representatives of the eight Sunday schools in this township actively affiliated with the association took part in a helpful program of devotional exercises, addresses and reports.

The meeting opened with singing led by Mr. C. H. Warren with Mrs. Brand at the piano; scripture reading by Rev. J. F. VanEvera; prayer by Rev. Rander and Mr. Vercoe; words of welcome by Superintendent H. D. Paxon of the Presbyterian Church, and solos by Mrs. C. G. Alexander and Mr. Albert Renning. A complete and interesting report of the annual meeting held at the North Avenue M. E. church a year ago was read.

The thought of the afternoon was the "Standard Sunday School" and the necessity of raising the standard of work in every Sunday school until our township and county shall stand in "the front line." This progressive movement was clearly illustrated by charts and should be an inspiration to Sunday school officers to lend their aid to this end. Short addresses bearing on this thought were given by Mrs. F. D. Everett, Mr. L. J. Yager, Honorable V. V. Barnes, Rev. Leuder, and Rev. R. Calvin Dobson. Interdenominational work is greatly stimulated through these Sunday school associations. Miss Una J. Minto brought a helpful and inspiring message gleaned from addresses given by Dr. Eisler and Prof. Atherton at the state convention held at Danville.
