MILITARY CARS REACH PACIFIC COAST
 First Overland Trip Made by Cadets. Col. Davidson in Command
 Battling through numerous storms and over seemingly impassible roads, eight Cadillac military motors, which comprise the first military motor caravan ever to make a transcontinental trip, arrived in Los Angeles, Cal. Wednesday, July 21st. The machines are manned by cadets from the Northwestern Military Academy, under command of Colonel Davidson.
 In the general plan being advocated for military preparedness by the United States, the military caravan is being seriously considered, according to Col. Davidson. In this branch, he declares, the country is pathetically weak.
 The cars in the squadron are of various Cadillac models, from that of 1910 to the new eight-cylinder machines. The 1910 machine, which acts as a balloon destroyer, has a record of having covered the country from the Atlantic to the Pacific ocean, and from the St. Lawrence river to the Gulf of Mexico.
 An officers' reconnaissance car also is included in the caravan. A detailed report of the trip, including maps of the roads traversed, will be forwarded to the war department within the next few days, according to Col. Davidson.
 The colonel and the cadets are the recipients of much entertaining and are making a successful showing to the citizens in the west. The party, it will be remembered, left this city about the tenth of June.

BELIEVE CLARK SHOT SELF
 Finding of Gun Near Place of Death Confirms Official Suspicion.
 Shelbyville, July 27.—Searchers for the gun with which Paul Clark was shot on the highway south of this city found the weapon in the immediate vicinity of where the shot is supposed to have been fired, and where it was heard by James Evans and Mrs. Barden.
 The gun was lying in the weeds fifteen feet west of the main benton track of the road, and about 150 yards south of the crossroad. The finding of the weapon at that point confirms the officials in their belief that young Clark shot himself.

AGED MAN KILLED BY TRAIN
 John Kline, Broadwell, Ill., Miscalculates at C. & A. Crossing.
 Broadwell, July 27.—John Kline, aged eighty-two years, a wealthy farmer of this locality, was struck and instantly killed by the south bound C. & A. Limited.
 Mr. Kline was driving in an open rig and being slightly deaf it is thought he did not hear the approaching train. His skull was fractured and body badly mutilated.

MAN REVIVED FROM DROWNING EXPIRES
 Hemorrhage Finishes Work Water Did Not Complete.
 Springfield, Ill., July 27.—Revived by artificial respiration for a short time, after he had been dragged lifeless from the Sangamon river, Pete Tones, a Greek of Fancy Prairie, section hand for the Chicago and Alton railroad, succumbed to hemorrhage of the lungs near Sherman.
 Tones' cries brought the men of the gang to the side of the river, but not until after the pains he was suffering had pulled him under, so that it was several minutes before the boy's body was recovered.
 Strenuous efforts restored the victim to regular breathing, but before consciousness was fully restored a hemorrhage of the lungs ended his life.
