BEATRICE LA PALME SINGING AT RAVINIA PARK



Beatrice La Palme, after a very successful opera season last year at Ravinia Park, and a winter of concert work at the Princess Theatre at Montreal, Canada, with Francis McMillan, violinist, and also other places in Canada, has returned to Ravinia Park this season, and in all her clever art, charms once more her ardent admirers.

Those who have seen Miss La Palme in "The Secret of Susanne," which, according to the actress herself, she is very fond of, have truly enjoyed the story which is well portrayed by her fascinating acting. The cunning art of keeping the secret of her habit of smoking from her husband, the count, is cleverly done

by her interpretation of the part she takes, the countess. After the story is all told and laughed over, the good natured audience leaves the scene smiling indulgently over the woman smoker. La Palme's most popular acting has been done in this opera and in "The Jewels of the Madonna," a story portraying love so great as to prompt the stealing of the jewels of the Madonna. These two operas have been given on the same evening, and both roles which Miss La Palme sings Countess Gil in the first and Malibella in the second, call for distinctly contrasting acting which is very well done. The ease with which she plays the heavy part of Malibella after the light

comedy of "The Secret of Susanne" is quite remarkable and one can scarcely imagine that the same person is playing both roles.

Miss La Palme, who is also a skilled violinist, having won great honors in England, while still quite a child, has been connected with the Opera Comique in Paris for four years; and has done much stage work at the Covent Gardens, London.

The artist has expressed her great admiration for Highland Park and Highland Park can truly be said to admire her. This charming little actress is to be heard in Martha and I Pagliacci this week at Ravinia Park.
