Moraine Hotel Notes

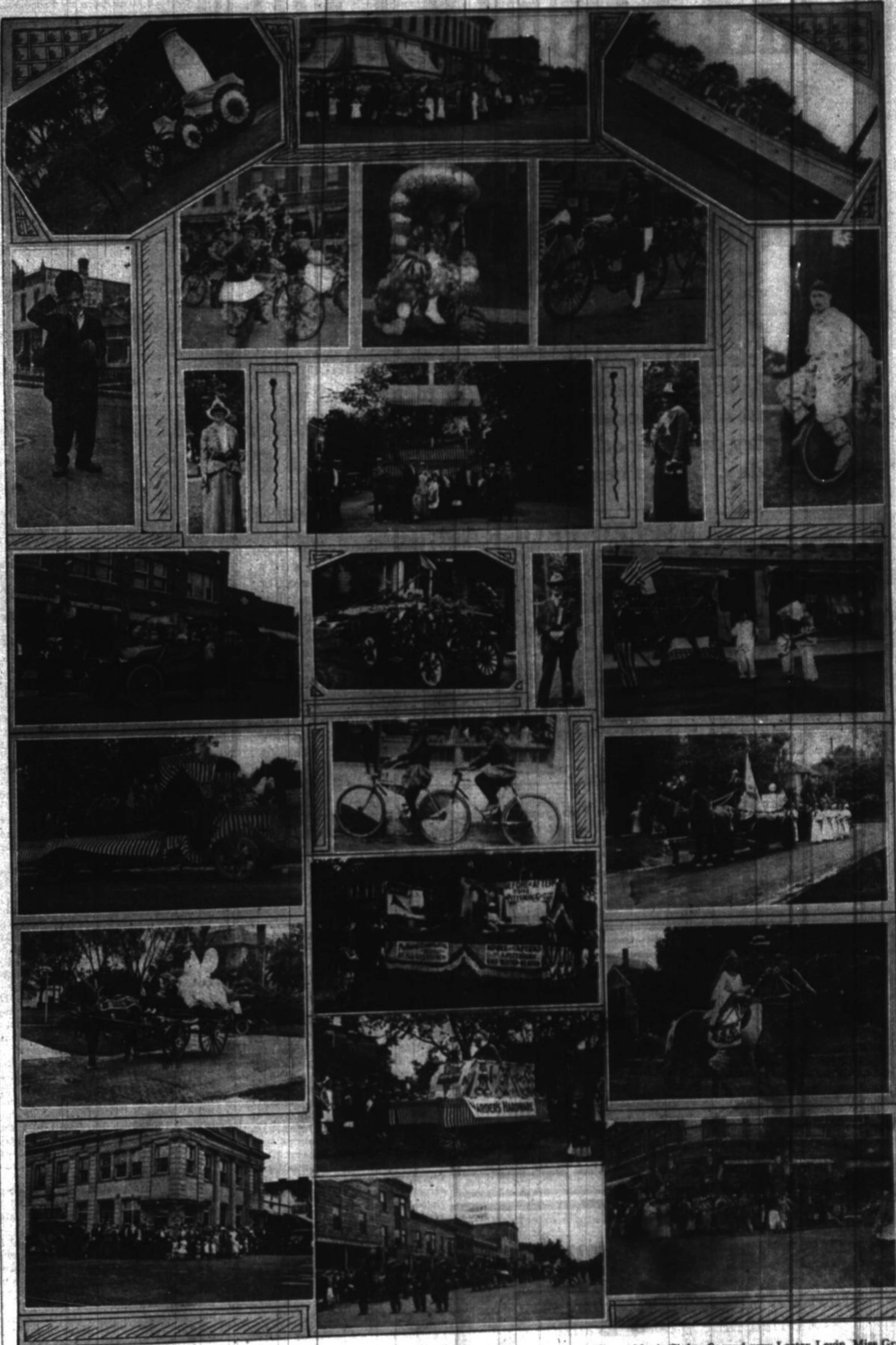
