MAN DIES IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Another is Seriously Injured When Train Hits Car.

Madison, Wis., Aug. 17.—Clarke Payntor, forty years old, was killed, and John Bergman, thirty years old, seriously hurt when an automobile in which they were riding was hit by a freight train on the Chicago and North Western railroad at a grade crossing one mile north of Mendota station.

Bergman and the automobile were carried on the plot of the locomotive for a quarter of a mile before the train could be stopped. Payntor was hurled some distance from the car and was dead when picked up. Both men resided at Wannakee. Payntor leaves a widow and four children.

BADGERS AID PLAN FOR DIXIE HIGHWAY

Improved Sheridan Drive May Be Connected With Big Project.

Milwaukee, Aug. 17.—The Wisconsin end of the proposed improved Sheridan road from Chicago to Milwaukee, which will run through Racine and Kenosha counties, may be some part of the famous Dixie highway, which bids fair within the near future to be the longest stretch of improved highway in the world.

As soon as the plans to improve the Sheridan road from Chicago to Milwaukee are formulated and become effective the three counties mentioned may ask to be admitted to the Dixie association, which has control of the stupendous project to have one long, continuous stretch of road from Florida through eight states to Chicago. This will mean that an automobile can start from Miami, Fla., and run over roads of concrete, asphalt or brick, through the state for winter tourists, through Georgia, Tennessee, Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana, Michigan and Illinois. Michigan, after looking on for a considerable length of time, asked for admission to the association and was admitted a few weeks ago.

That the project devised by representative business men in Florida is no idle dream is evidenced from the fact that over \$10,000,000 has been voted in bonds and in tax levies by the various counties through which the famous highway will pass. Property owners along sections of the road which is now being constructed have given financial aid to the plan and work is being rapidly pushed.

COMPLETE DRAINAGE CANAL

Marinette Waterway is 14 Miles Long, 20 Feet Wide and Six Feet Deep.

Marinette, Wis., Aug. 17.—The first drainage canal in Marinette county has been completed.

The Marinette canal is fourteen miles long, twenty feet wide and six feet deep. It extends from the Peshtigo river, northeasterly into Porterfield. It drains hundreds of acres of land and makes swamps good for agricultural lands. The canal cost \$20,000 and this is said by land owners benefited. The canal empties into the Peshtigo river and is one of the largest drains in northern Wisconsin.

Boy Drowned in Wisconsin River.

Wausau, Wis., Aug. 17.—Marcus Luettke, fourteen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Alden, was drowned in the Wisconsin river. Divers tried to locate him for one hour, and finally the body was recovered. Doctors used a pulmotor for three quarters of an hour without success. Companions tried to save him, and two others nearly drowned.

Box Car Robber is Sentenced.

Grand Rapids, Wis., Aug. 17.—R. I. Bernier, who was arrested for breaking into a freight car on the Chicago and Northwestern railroad at Marshfield pleaded guilty to the charge before Judge Park, and was sentenced to six years at Waupun.

Reward for Saving Life.

Beloit, Wis., Aug. 17.—Dewey Rosenthal, son of assistant Postmaster L. F. Rosenthal, has received a reward from Mark E. Jones of Janesville whose life the boy saved recently at Delavan lake.

Boy Drowned in Lake.

Mantoloking, Wis., Aug. 17.—Eleven year old Louis Henline, a Two Rivers boy, lost his life while bathing in the lake. It was the first drowning accident at Two Rivers this season.

Knitting Mills Resume.

Oconto, Wis., Aug. 17.—The Oconto branch of the Marinette Knitting mills has resumed operations with a full crew after a shut down since last November.
