Sealed proposals will be received by the council of Highland Park at the city hall on the 17th day of September, A. D. 1915 at 5 o'clock p. m. for the purchase of \$33,000.00 of bonds of the city of Highland Park.  
One issue of bonds aggregating the sum of \$23,000.00, known as Street Improvement Bonds and one issue of bonds aggregating the sum of \$10,000.00, known as bridge bonds, will be sold to the highest bidder at this time.  
All bonds will be of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each and bear interest at the rate of 5% per annum, payable semi-annually.  
The issue of \$23,000.00 of Street Improvement Bonds will bear date of October 1st, 1915 and be due and payable on October 1st, 1916.  
The issue of \$10,000.00 of bridge bonds will bear date of October 1st, 1915 and become due and payable on October 1st, 1917.  
The above issues were duly authorized by a vote of the authorized electors of said city at an election held August 21st, 1915.  
Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check for 5% of the amount of the bid as an evidence of good faith.
