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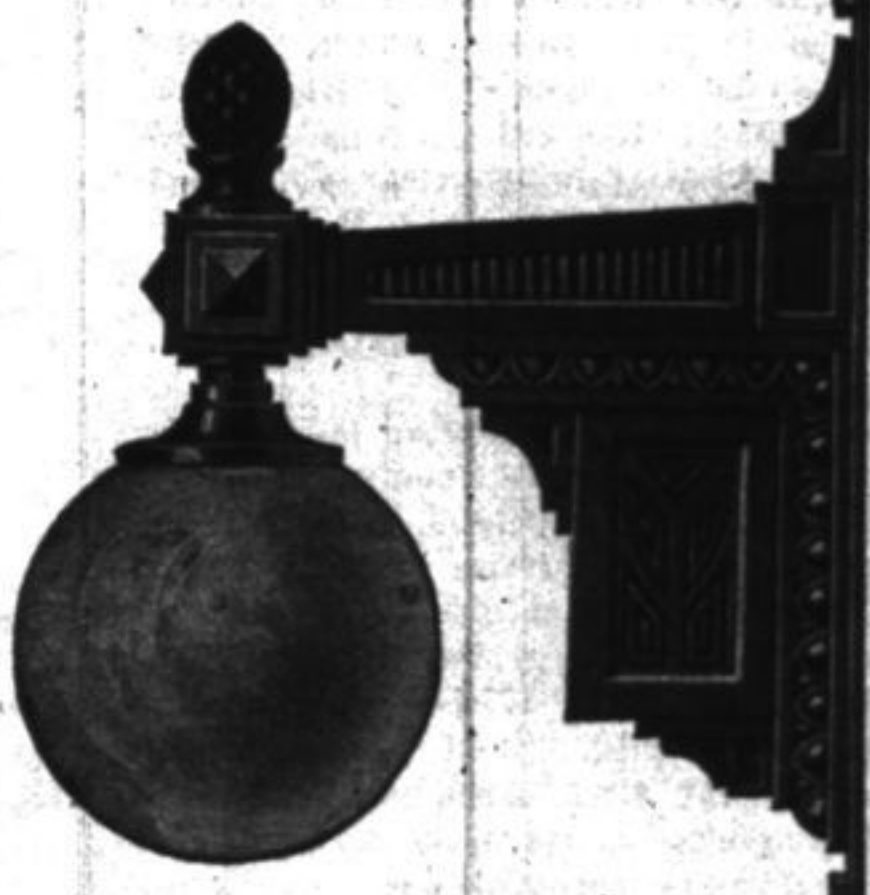

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Mandamus Asked Against Board of Review

Declaring that the Lake County Board of Review failed to do its duty in the laying of valuations for assessment on the estate of the late Robert W. Sears, Attorney Martin C. Decker Saturday filed in the circuit court a petition asking that a mandamus writ issue against the board and Mrs. Anna Sears, widow of the late mail order king, forcing them into court to show why they should not fix the figures at the alleged proper value.

The filing of the petition did not come as a surprise, as several days ago when the Board of Review made their ruling in the Sears estate Attorney Decker intimated he would resort to the mandamus route to get what he was after for the town of Warren.
