One of the interesting features of the club is the recognition certificate given for credits for work accomplished. There are four seals that can be secured for achievement and to earn these is certainly an honor for any girl, for it means that she has been faithful in certain numerous duties for definite periods of time. We hope the winning of these seals will be a help to the members in the formation of good and permanent habits. In order that all girls may know for what credit seals are given we plan to publish each week a department and hope the girls will clip them out and keep them for reference.

We already have four clubs in Highland Park and these two make six. It is planned to organize more clubs in the near future. For this work we are sadly in need of leaders. The association rooms are being re-decorated preparatory to the fall opening in October. The association is greatly in need of a secretary's desk.

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
