**High School Notes**

Plans are being completed for a sixteen weeks' night school course to be held at the high school Monday, Tuesday and Thursday evenings of each week between the hours of 7:30 and 9:30, to begin Monday evening, October 11. Work will be offered in the wood and metal shops, and mechanical drawing. In the domestic science department work will be given in dressmaking, millinery, sewing and cooking, while the commercial department offers a good course in business arithmetic, bookkeeping, stenography and typewriting. The English department will offer business English and public speaking; the physical training directors will give swimming and gymnasium lessons. If sufficient interest is manifested, instruction in European history, civics, one or more foreign languages, and chorus work will be all given. Each evening the program will be the same.

Each student, upon entering for night school work, will be asked to pay one dollar, which will be returned to him at the end of the session if he reports for each evening. Students are to be required to pay for their own material and preparation for the Monday and Thursday classes will be necessary. A complete program of the session will be published in The Press next week.

The senior class, which has chosen Fairchild Doty as its president, numbers sixty-seven, which is a large number of seniors, there being four hundred and ten students in all.

Though football games have not been scheduled, it is planned to play two games with Waukegan, two with New Trier, and one each with Riverside, Kenosha and Chicago Latin.

Some of the new teachers are: Mr. E. J. Crago, who has charge of the physical and commercial geography and the chemistry, and who holds a M.A. degree from the University of Wisconsin; Mr. M. N. Demory, who has charge of physics and is a graduate of Chicago University, and Miss Wilhelmina Munson, a graduate of Oxford College for Women, teaching typewriting. These are teachers of successful experience and were chosen from a large number of applicants as the best instructors in their different lines.

There have been placed at different places over the school twelve German color prints, which are a great addition to the beauty of the school's decoration.

Mr. George Bolan has been elected chief counselor.

Mr. Robert Louis Barron, violinist, assisted by Mrs. Catherine Ried-Martin, gave a recital in general assembly Thursday morning.
