never existed, save in belief and fear. Christian Science has come to the world; dawning, as necessarily it must, upon a material age. The infidel, the atheist and the agnostic find God and His creation, and the true brotherhood of man.

Christian Science is not one of the many ways of healing the sick; but it is the only correct way, because it is God's way. It is the way that Truth has of destroying error; not by any physical means (which is only exchanging one error for another); but to correct the wrong, by the right understanding of the Science of eternal life.

New Orleans Lawyer-Publisher to Fight Bigamy Charge.

Milwaukee, Oct. 5.—With affidavits and the promise of a divorced wife to aid him, Charles E. George, New Orleans lawyer, publisher and clubman, arrived here Monday and gave himself up to the authorities to await trial on a bigamy charge, preferred by wife No. 2, Mrs. May E. Ritter-George of New York City.

The divorced wife who promised to aid him is Mrs. Ida L. Austrian, half sister of Brodie L. Duke, multi-millionaire tobacco man of New York. Mrs. Austrian is said to have gone to New Orleans last week, upon learning that George was being sought by the Milwaukee police, and presented him with affidavits to prove that he was divorced from her before contracting his fourth and last marriage. Mrs. Austrian was George's third wife. After promising that she would do all in her power to assist him, Mrs. Austrian, it is said, returned to New York, declaring that she would institute suit for damages against Mrs. Ritter-George.

The history of the lawyer-publisher's case began several weeks ago when Mrs. Ritter-George learned of his marriage to Miss Selma Klein, formerly a public stenographer in the Flankinton house here. That marriage took place on Nov. 6, 1912.
