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WAUKEGAN HIGH VICTOR OVER DEERFIELD-SHIELDS

GAME LOST BY NARROW MARGIN

Man Failing to Hold Perfectly Executed Forward Pass Proves Fatal in Victory For Local School the Last Minute

Deerfield-Shields high school eleven was defeated by Waukegan 9 to 3 Saturday, on the Waukegan gridiron. Deerfield failing to stop the off tackle plays of their opponents, were scored upon in the first ten minutes of play. After this the home team settled down and outplayed the Waukegan team for the remainder of the game. A poor pass by Deerfield's center gave Waukegan their other two points when he passed the ball over the head of the punter. Bolan falling on the ball in back of his goal, resulted in the safety.

Deerfield's score came after the ball had been worked down to Waukegan's 25 yard line, when Captain Bolan kicked the ball over the cross bar from a place kick. Gaining confidence and "pep" after this, her backs tore holes for good gains through Waukegan's line. End runs and forward passes were also used successfully. Waukegan was meeting a stone wall and could make no headway when holding the ball. In the last few minutes of play, Deerfield worked the ball from midfield to Waukegan's three yard line by long end runs and forward passes. With but a few minutes to play, Deerfield made three futile attempts to buck the line. The Waukegan players, expecting another buck through the line were all drawn in when Deerfield's quarterback called for a forward pass to left end. This would have resulted in at least a tie score, had not luck been against the local team. Standing behind the goal line, left end received a perfect pass but failed to hold it. A second later the game was called. Capt. Bolan was easily the star for the home eleven.

NO DANGER OF SCARLET EPIDEMIC

Health Department Has Situation Well in Hand. No New Cases

The closing, this week, of the primary building of the Elm Place School on account of a threatened scarlet fever epidemic was the cause of considerable excitement in Highland Park. We are informed, however, by Dr. Bergen that there is no apparent danger of an epidemic and that the Department of Health have the situation well in hand and are taking every possible precaution to prevent any spread of the disease. The scare started one day last week when the little eight-year-old daughter of Frank Evans was found to have symptoms of scarlet fever after having been in school all day. It is not known whether she exposed the other children or not but as a matter of precaution the board of health ordered the primary building closed for a week and also issued an order barring all children under fourteen years of age from the theatre. While the board of health believe that there is no danger of an epidemic they advise, as a measure of extra precaution, that all children be kept away from any public gatherings for the present.

U. S. GOVERNMENT URGES CITIZENSHIP

INVITES IMMIGRANTS TO NIGHT SCHOOL

Investigation Shows that there are Over Three Million Foreigners in this Country Who Can't Read or Speak English

The Department of the Interior, through its Bureau of Education, has issued a lithographed poster, 30 by 20 inches in size, which is being sent to the various post offices, public schools, and industrial establishments of the country, urging immigrants to educate themselves for American citizenship.

In the foreground of the poster "Uncle Sam" is represented as grasping the hand of an immigrant workman, while in the background is seen a residence, a public school, and a naturalization judge handing "citizen's papers" to an immigrant.

Under the bold faced title, "America First," are urgent invitations to attend night school, learn English, and become citizens. These invitations, with brief sentences setting forth the advantages of such action, are given in English and in six immigrant languages, viz: Italian, Polish, Yiddish, Lithuanian, Bohemian, and Hungarian.

Investigation has shown that there are in this country 3,000,000 foreign-born whites, 10 years and over, who are unable to read or even speak English. More than one-half of these immigrants are unable to read or write in any language. As the posters will be hung in conspicuous places it is to be hoped that by means of this pictorial and written invitation immigrants will have their attention called to the night schools of their communities; and that where there is any considerable number of immigrants and no night schools the poster may inspire the authorities in these communities to establish such schools. This is a part of a more comprehensive plan for preparing immigrants for American life and citizenship.

New State Aid Road on Milwaukee Avenue



The accompanying map shows the most important thoroughfares in the new state aid road on Milwaukee avenue which has recently been opened to the public. The completion of this road offers a good route from Chicago to the northwest portion of Cook county, except for a short distance between Niles and the beginning of the concrete pavement.

When several of the contemplated pavements from Evanston, Wilmette and other North Shore suburbs are completed, and when the concrete section on Milwaukee avenue has been extended to the county line, as is now planned, there will be a direct road route from Chicago and the North Shore suburbs to the attractive lake region of Northern Illinois and Southern Wisconsin. NEARBY NEWS ITEMS OF LOCAL INTEREST

HOPE TO INCREASE TRAINING CAMP

Sheridan Road Improvement Association Meets. Waukegan Files Petition for Recall. Odd Fellows Meet

Hope to Increase Recruits.
Col. W. J. Nicholson, commander of Fort Sheridan, and of the military training camp, spoke on preparedness Saturday before the Irish Fellowship club in the Hotel La Salle, Chicago. He expressed the hope that facilities would be provided next year for the training of 3,000 citizens as soldiers at Fort Sheridan and that there would be 10,000 recruits at the naval training station instead of 600. "Our 28,000 men in the regular army would last about eighty-eight minutes in a regular battle," he said. "I must be careful what I say about preparedness, because I may be subjected to severe criticism, but I will say that preparedness is essential in any business, and particularly essential in the business of governments. The recruits who were in the camp are not Napoleons because of their training, but they know which end of the rifle goes against their shoulder, and have learned how to tell their right hand without stopping to write imaginary words in the air."

Sheridan Road Association Meets.
That great progress is being made in the plans for a permanent highway along the lake shore from Milwaukee to Chicago and intermediate communities and cities, was the substance of reports made at a meeting of sub-chairmen of the executive committee of the Sheridan Road Improvement Association, at the Hotel Pfister in Milwaukee, on Tuesday. The meeting was a most enthusiastic one and the report, as formulated at the meeting, will be submitted to the executive committee of 30, of which George A. West of Milwaukee, is chairman.

Petition For Recall.
That recall petition, whereby the voters of Waukegan will have an opportunity to say whether or not the city shall remain under the commission form of government, has bobbed up again and this time it is declared for a certainty that the necessary papers will be filed at the city offices today. Mayor Pearce has been notified that it is the intention of those behind the petition to get it before the proper authorities not later than Thursday. "If my information is correct," the mayor said, "it appears that this time the thing is going through."

Lake Co. Odd Fellows Meet.
Odd Fellows numbering 250 from every nook and corner of Lake county, convened in Libertyville Monday night and heard some very forceful addresses on "Democracy," or the extension of brotherhood amongst men.

Among the speakers were Attorney Christian T. Heydecker of Waukegan; Dr. R. H. T. Nesbitt of Waukegan; Mr. Kent of Waukegan, and Reverend Gallagher of Waukegan. Several others gave addresses, and it was near midnight before the meeting was brought to a close. The members of the Lake County Odd Fellows' Association voted to hold their next regular monthly meeting in Waukegan.

Winnetka Petitions for Movie Theatre
A movement is now on foot to secure a movie theatre for Winnetka, which has hitherto been without that convenience. Two petitions have already been presented to the village board asking for permission to build a theatre, one by Thomas Kelly and William Ralph of Highland Park early in October, and another by Gus Lindahl of Winnetka, at last Tuesday's meeting of the board.

On the latter occasion the judiciary committee, to whom the matter had been submitted, reported that according to village ordinance the petitions must be presented signed by a majority of the property owners within a radius of 500 feet of the proposed site of the theatre. As this had not been done in the case of either petition, no permit could be granted to either petitioner.

Winnetka picture fans are said to be pleased with the prospect of having their own pictures. At present they are compelled to go to Chicago or Wilmette or Highland Park to enjoy their favorite recreation.

However, before adjournment a motion was made to authorize the treasurer to purchase street improvement bonds No. 220 to the amount of \$4,000, par value. Motion carried. The matter was held over until another time hoping that the residents on that street would be willing to give a sufficient frontage to make it a street of usual width. Meeting adjourned.
