Highland Park Woman's Club

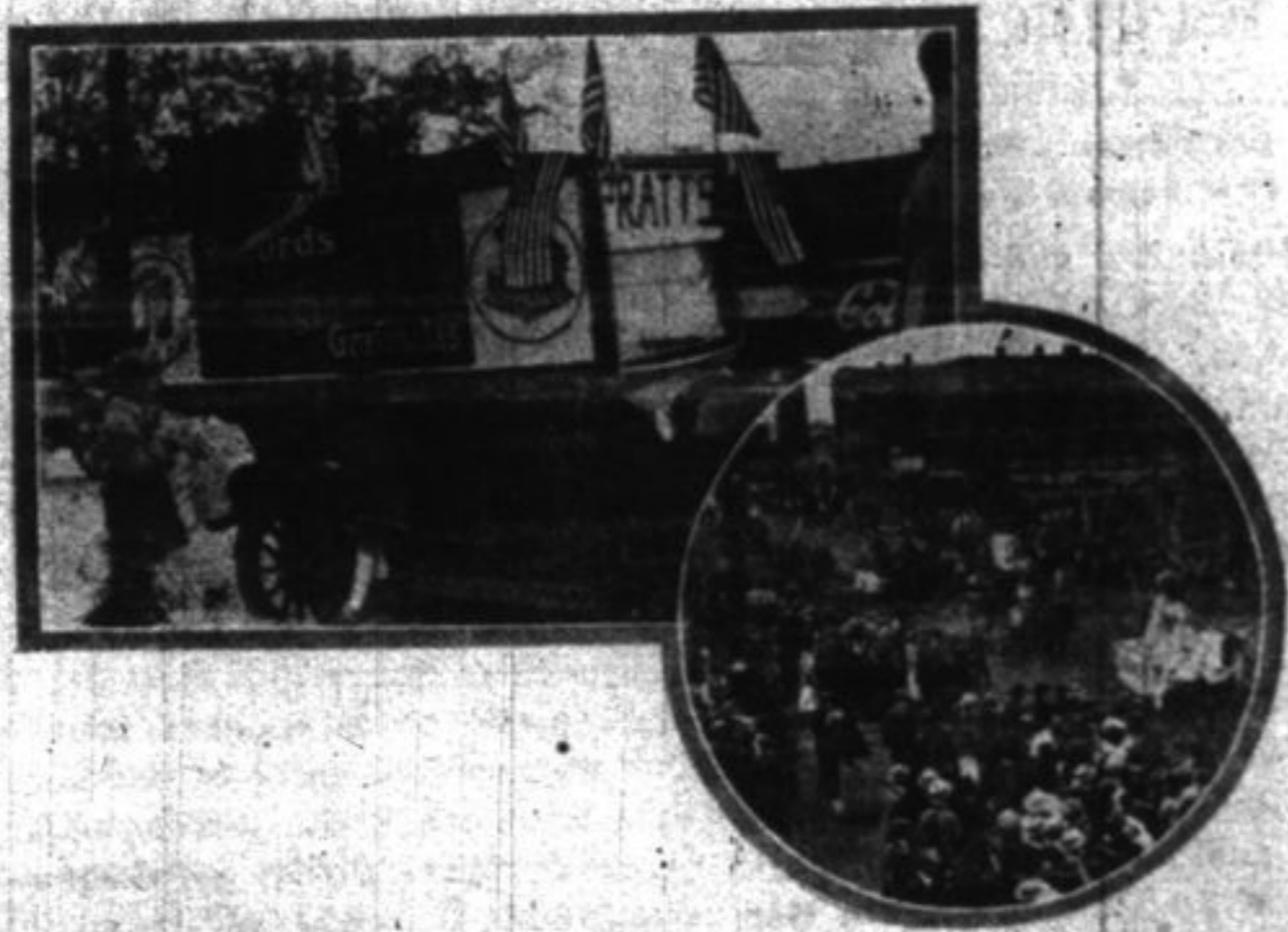

Prof. Richard L. Sandwick has recently written a book, entitled "How to Study and What to Study." The book which has been published by D. C. Heath and Company, and has aroused much enthusiasm among educators in general, is simply written, easy to understand, and is a manual for both high school and college students. Prof. Bagley of the Illinois University says of the book: "The style is simple, forceful, and attractive, and the material thoroughly in accord with the regular principles of psychology." He is about to make use of it in his classes. Prof. Steever S. Colvin of Brown University, says: "It would be a fine thing if every high school student and college freshman would read it." Chas. H. Judd of University of Chicago, says: "The problem is of great importance, and the way you have worked it out is interesting, indeed." Parents who are interested in helping the pupil to choose a proper course in high school or to prepare for vacations will be especially interested to read part two of the book, which covers an entirely new field.

On Thursday of last week Mr. Dennis, a professional singer of Chicago, and a student at the School of Music, Northwestern University, entertained the students with a number of old English ballads.

Lincoln School

Dr. Frank McMurray of Teachers' College, Columbia University, spoke to an interested audience of school teachers, Friday evening, at the school. Dr. McMurray's talk was of great force, and carried with it the solution of many problems which arise in the school room. His methods for solving present day difficulties are plain and logical, and if applied would make the teaching of children much easier for both instructor and pupil. He spoke of the great need of a pleasing personality in the teacher, which includes a soft firm voice, a kind influence, and a neat appearance. He also said that the school should reflect society values, more than it does, which would eventually help the student to realize relative values and choose the greater fact from the lesser one. After the talk Dr. McMurray answered questions of those who wanted advice, thus many helpful suggestions were made to teachers.

On next Wednesday the pupils will observe Thanksgiving, by a program of suitable songs and poetry, in general assembly.
