Obituary
After a slow illness of some months
Mrs. J. L. Vetter nee Anna Barbara
Baumler died on Wednesday morn-
ing, November 24th. She was born
at Merklingen, Germany, on April 6,
1846. At the age of twenty-one, she
came to Chicago and was married to
John Leonard Vetter. The young
couple made their permanent home
in Deerfield. Eight children were
born to this union, three of them dy-
ing in infancy.
In the summer of 1868 she was
converted under the ministry of Rev.
W. Goessel and joined the Evange-
lical Association and remained a
faithful member until death.
Her life work was accomplished in
the home, as she was a splendid wife
and mother, almost an ideal home
keeper. Being of a cheerful disposi-
tion her home was a good place to be
in. It was always bright and open
to strangers and her hospitality was
especially extended to the earlier
ministers and then later to the stu-
dent pastors of the local church.
She leaves an aged husband, five
children, ten grandchildren and four
sisters in Germany to survive her.
The children present at the funeral
were George E. Vetter of Chicago,
Mrs. A. E. Strayer of Glenview, John
L. Vetter of Deerfield, Mrs. C. L.
Sorg of Newton, Kansas, and Miss
Jennie Vetter of Deerfield. The fun-
eral services were at the Presbyte-
rian church Friday afternoon at one
o'clock with the Rev. C. K. Orsborn
officiating.

just as smart.
Bureau scarfs and pincushions are

of pretty flowered muslin or lawn. A
white or pale pink ground, on which
are scattered little red roses or blue
forget-me-nots or any dainty little flow-
er, can be used. A design of butter-
cups on a white ground or violets or
even dainty green leaves would be pret-
ty also.
The scarf for the bureau top is made
perfectly plain and edged with lace.
A white featherstitch gives a pretty
finish to the edge. The ends of the
scarf may hang down a little on either
side, or the scarf may fit the bureau top
exactly.
The pincushion cover is made of the
same material and edged with lace.
It is decorated at the corners with lit-
tle ribbon bows the shade of the flower
in the design. A piece of satin or
silk of solid color may be put under
the muslin if desired.
Another household gift which may
find acceptance is a cover for the un-
sightly telephone book. This should
be of some appropriate color for the
room or den where it is to be hung.
It should be lined with some plain
color. The edges are bound with old
gold braid. Underneath is a heavy
board foundation to hold the telephone
book.

GREAT BRITAIN CONTROLS CABLE LINES
Messages May be Sent by Wireless to Germany, Austria-Hungary and Turkey
With Great Britain and her allies in control of all cable lines from America, communication with Germany, Austria-Hungary, Bulgaria and Turkey via cable is made impossible. The only way these countries can be reached for quick communication is via the wireless stations at Tuckerton, N. J., and Sayville, L. I. The first named station works direct with Eltweiss and the latter with Nauen, Germany, from which points messages are forwarded via land lines.
The Western Union Telegraph Company is in receipt of advice from the wireless stations that they can handle considerably more traffic than that now handled for the countries of the central powers.
