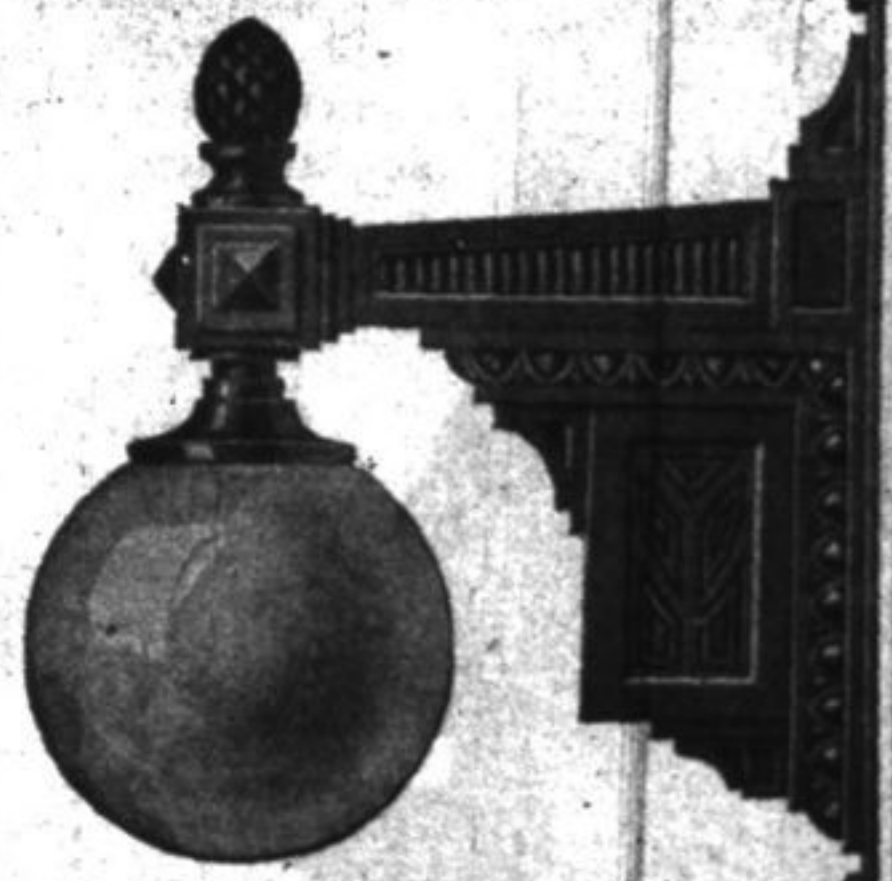

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SHARE SEASON'S CHEER WITH WINTER BIRDS

MANY CHICKADEES ABOUT THIS YEAR

The Birds Will Appreciate Food, Now That Their Natural Supply is Restricted by the Ice and Snow

We are reminded by the president of the Illinois Audubon Society to be sure to share some of our Christmas cheer with our good friends, the birds. Now that so large a proportion of the birds' feeding areas—the surface of the ground and the exposed sides of the trunks and branches of the trees—is encased with ice, the natural supply of food is restricted. The birds will appreciate sunflower seeds, small grains, bread crumbs, scraps of meat and suet fastened up where they can grab into it, etc. Feeding shelves where privacy can be had without danger from cats will be duly appreciated and patronized. Let the shelf be within sight of one's living room and the enjoyment of watching the bird guests will quicken one's interest in life. It will add one more charm to winter.

The most numerous winter birds at this time in Highland Park are the chickadees. Last winter there seemed to be very few about. Thus far their cheerful calls have been heard every morning. Now and then some juncos are found in company with the chickadees. Neither the downy nor the hairy woodpeckers seem to be plentiful, for one reason or another. Occasionally a nuthatch is seen. A pair of cardinals is apparently spending the winter on one of the estates bordering on South Sheridan Road. All these winter birds need to insure a merry Christmas and a happy New Year is the wherewithal for a full stomach. Shelter they know how to find for themselves.

Loganberry Juice

One of Oregon's opportunities which promises yearly and rapid development is the manufacture and distribution of loganberry juice. The logan berry is a fruit peculiarly adapted to the soil and climate of the Willamette Valley. In this zone it attains the highest perfection both in richness, luxuriance and flavor. As a table fruit, jam and preserve, it will probably never acquire a great degree of fame, the seedy nature of the fruit being distasteful to many with rather sensitive digestive organs; loganberry jelly, however, is most delicious and can be combined with the juice of other fruit, this combination securing a most delightful degree of acidity. It is as a beverage, however, that the loganberry has already secured prominence and favorable notice wherever tested or tasted. The juice of the loganberry combined with the required content of cane sugar, sterilized and bottled, will keep, unopened, without change indefinitely. Diluted with plain or carbonated water and properly iced,
