**THE BIRTH OF A NATION—STILL PLAYS**

How it was Started, and What it Really is.  
At Colonial Theatre

When David W. Griffith completed  
"The Birth of a Nation" he probably  
did not realize that he had on his  
hands a spectacle that would limit  
his scope of presentation. He saw  
only his dream of the master photo-  
drama come true. After he had pre-  
sented it in private at the White  
House, he began to study out how  
best to show it to the public. "The  
Birth of a Nation" was not an ordi-  
nary picture that could be shown to  
advantage in any sort of house. It  
required music—a symphony orches-  
tra, Griffith decided. It was a two-  
dollar spectacle, and Griffith, the ar-  
tist, decided that the people must  
have two dollars' worth—even those  
who sat in other parts of the house  
where the prices ranged down to a  
quarter. That is why Griffith work-  
ed so hard on the presentation as well  
as the production. That is why it is  
possible to get the full value of the  
spectacle only when it is presented  
in large houses such as the Colonial,  
the most beautiful theater in Amer-  
ica, in Chicago. While "The Birth  
of a Nation" has been sent out on the  
road it has been found impossible to  
show it to advantage in the smaller  
theaters. That is why the spectacle,
