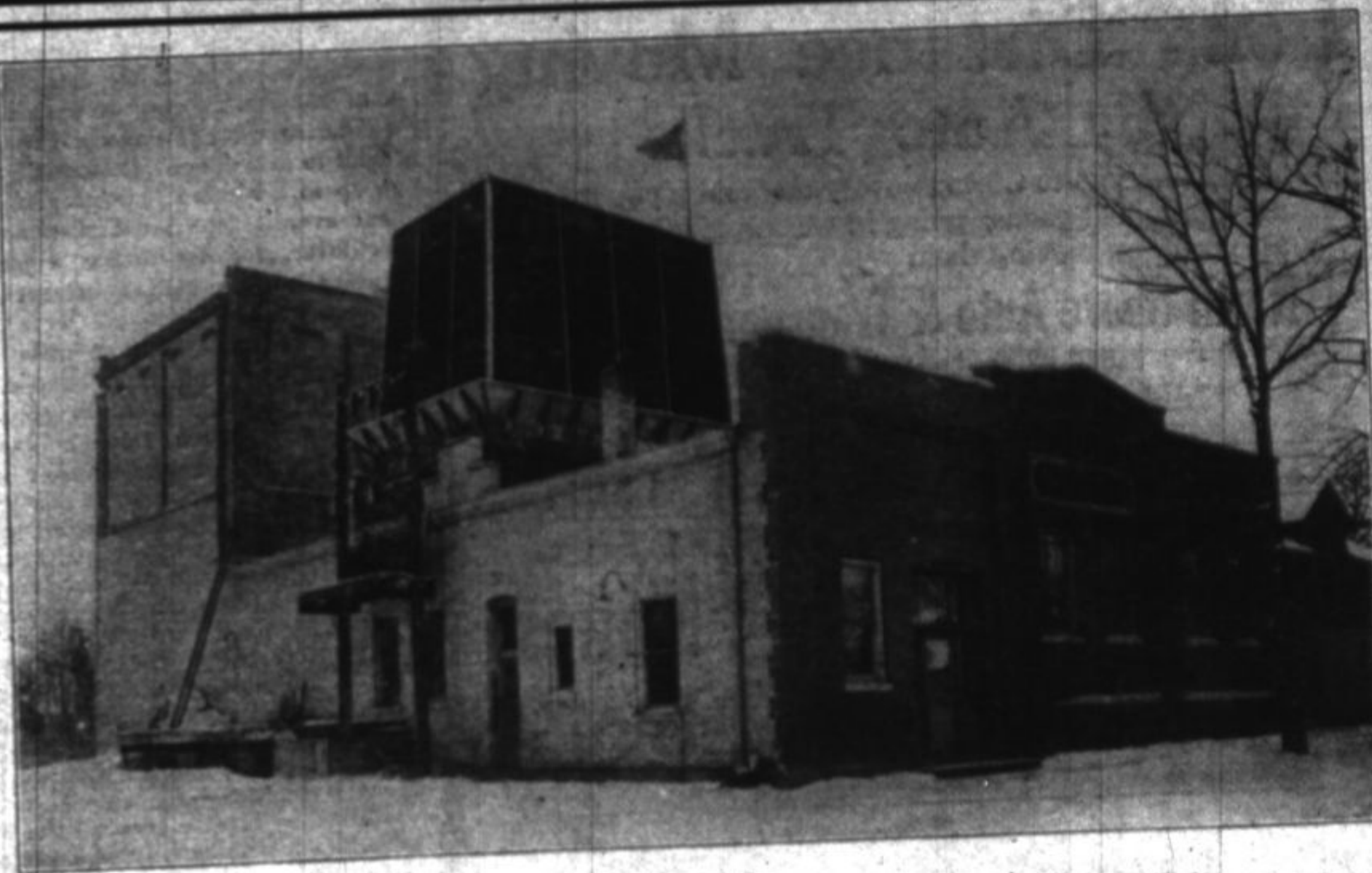
To Tour Europe in a New Series of Illustrated Travel Talks
