THREE DAYS TEACHERS' INSTITUTE

Teachers from Elm Place, Lincoln and
Ravinia Schools in Attendance

County Superintendent T. Arthur Simpson has called all the teachers of the elementary schools of Lake County together at Waukegan for a three days' institute, beginning today (Thursday). The teachers from Elm Place, Lincoln, and Ravinia schools are in attendance. It has been the custom of Superintendent Simpson to hold an annual institute of one week some time in the month of August but it is his belief that such institutes are not nearly so useful as those which occur during the months when school organizations are at their best and teachers more responsive to suggestions and to inspiring addresses from educational leaders. Many of the more progressive county superintendents of the state have already changed their institutes from summer to mid-winter dates and it is probable that the present institute will take the place of the usual session in August in Lake county. Mr. Simpson has secured for lecturers Dr. C. P. Colgrove of the Teachers' College, Cedar Falls, Iowa, and Dr. L. J. Rettiger of the department of physiology of the Terre Haute Normal School. Mrs. Mabel S. Falch of the Ravinia School will have charge of the music.

ADVERTISING MEN VISIT GREAT LAKES

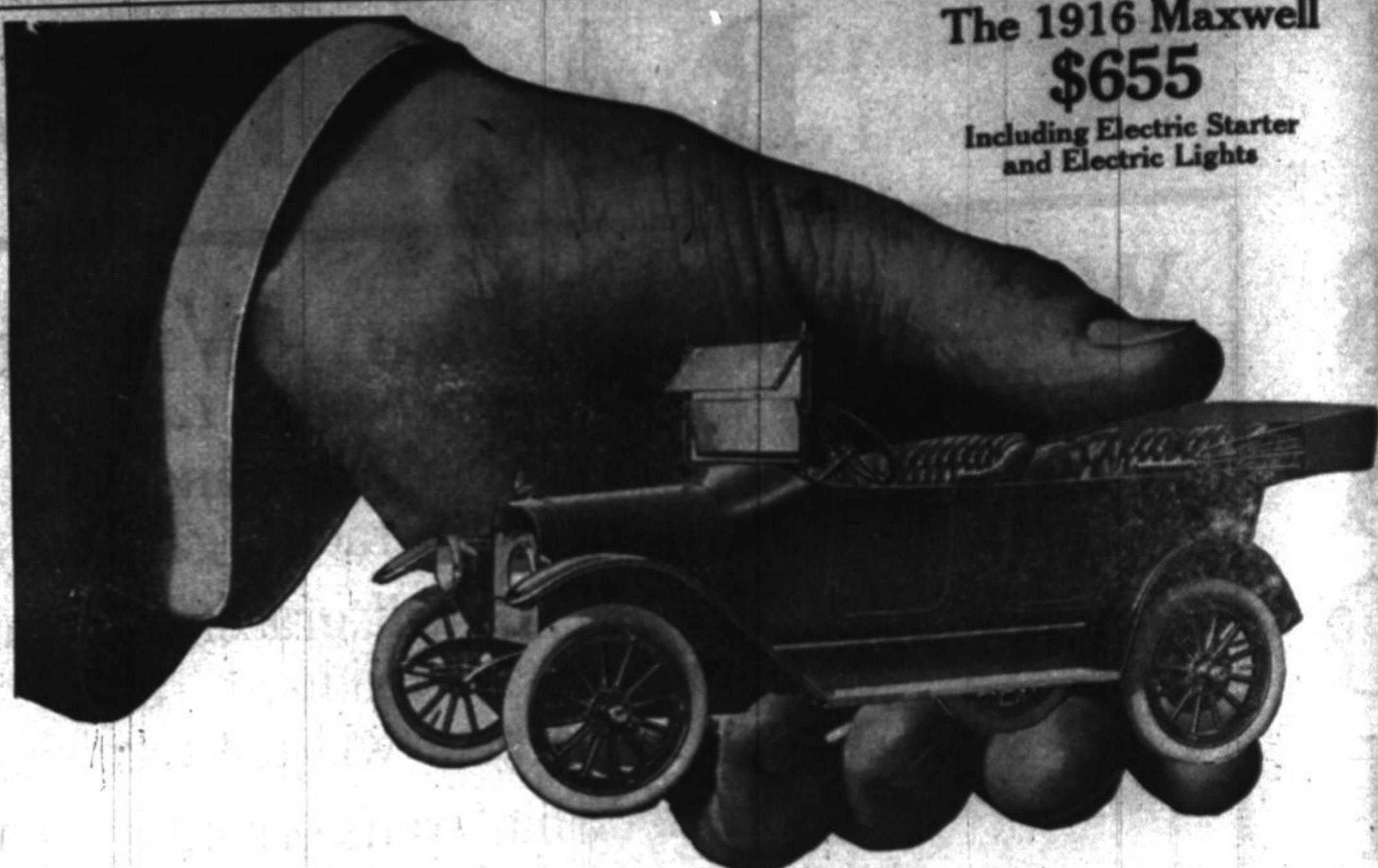
Commander W. A. Moffett Shows Visitors Through Naval Training Station
