Due to their efforts conditions have improved wonderfully and they are encouraging the production of cleaner and better dairy products. Nothing can be more effective than active organizations of housewives who will cooperate with the health authorities and the producers in inject enthusiasm and encouragement into those who are struggling to improve the quality of milk and its products.
