COMMANDER MOFFETT RECEIVES DISTINCTION

service, and it is the highest honor in the form of a decoration within the gift of the United States government. Commander Moffett has been signally honored by being one of the first of the few officers of the Navy to receive this high distinction which is more coveted than promotion to high rank.
The granting of this signal honor to Commander Moffett makes his service record of interest. Commander Moffett is a Southerner, having been born at Charleston, S. C., October 31, 1869. He entered the Naval Academy September the 6th, 1886, being appointed from the first district, South Carolina, graduated in 1890, and was first assigned to duty as a midshipman on the Constellation.
During the Spanish-American War, he served on the Charleston, Culgoe and Boston, at the Cavite Station, and in charge of Manila Harbor work, raising Spanish wrecks and opening the Pasig River to navigation.
He has had much experience as executive officer of the Culgoe, Marietta, St. Marys, Amphitrite, Monongahela, Vixen and Maryland, before being assigned to his present duty as commandant at the training station.

MISS BECK, OPERA SINGER, HURT
Re recuperating at Highland Park Hotel. Will Leave For New York this Week.
The following is a clipping from "The Sioux Falls Press" of Sunday, January 23rd:
"Twenty-six passengers and trainmen were injured when the Illinois Central passenger train north bound, left the rails about 8:30 Monday morning at a point between Gaza and Pringhar, Ia., about a mile north of Gaza, and plunged down a twelve foot embankment into a creek. A frozen rail which derailed the baggage car is thought to have been responsible for the wreck. The accident happened at a point where there is a twelve foot embankment at the approach of a short bridge over a small creek. Every car left the track and turned over with the exception of the engine and the Pullman, which both remained upright. The majority of the injured belonged to the De Koven Opera Co., which was to have shown here Monday."
This clipping should be particularly interesting to Highland Parkers

as many of the injured sang at Revinia Park last summer. Among those well known here were: Miss Ivy Scott, Mr. Wm. Schuster and Miss Lenore Beck. Miss Beck, at the present time is living at the Highland Park Hotel, recuperating from the injuries received which were in the nature of a dislocated knee cap and many bruises about the body. Miss Beck will be remembered as singing the roles of Kate Pinkerton in "Madame Butterfly," Alice in Lucia, and many others. She expects to leave this city Friday or Saturday for New York, and again take up her work.
