SYNOPSIS OF LECTURE ON CHRISTIAN SCIENCE

GIVEN BY VIRGIL O. STRICKLER, C. S.

Tuesday Evening Feb. 8th in the Church Edifice. Speaker introduced by Leon E. Stanhope of Winnetka. Large Attendance

Introductory Remarks by Mr. Stanhope Friends:

First Church of Christ, Scientist, of Highland Park, welcomes you and rejoices with you in the privilege of hearing the lecturer of the evening on the subject of Christian Science.

Christian Science comes with a message of loving help to all mankind, a message of health, of abundance, of peace, joy and happiness, to you and to all mankind, and it is the desire of this Church to lay before you some of the teachings of Christian Science which they have tried and found good.

These teachings reveal God as the only Creator, the only law-maker and His laws ever present and ever operative in the healing of all the manifestations of human fear, whether eternalized as sickness, sin, unhappiness, poverty, old age or death.

Two thousand years ago the preacher by the shore of Galilee taught the existence of God, the immortality of soul and the brotherhood of man, exhorting us not to be afraid and assuring us that this was the whole "law and the prophets."

The purpose of this lecture is to present for your consideration, from an authorized source, correct statements of Christian Science.

The lecturer is a member of the Board of Lectureship of the Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist in Boston, Mass., and will speak with authority on the subject.

I now take pleasure in introducing Mr. Virgil O. Strickler, C.S. of New York City.

It is undeniable that Christian Science has healed many sick people and has brought about the regeneration of many who were the victims of sin. Among its membership are those who have been healed of intemperance, of so-called chronic and organic diseases, as well as of maladies that were acute or functional. It has healed others of sorrow, fear, unhappiness and similar diseased mental conditions that often cause more suffering and distress than physical disorders.

In every case of Christian Science healing, whether the disease was chronic or acute, physical or mental, the cure was brought about without the use of hypnotism, mental suggestion, drugs or any material means, and entirely through the application of the spiritual and meta-physical teachings of Christian Science.

The healing of the sick, however, is not the primary purpose of Christian Science. According to the teachings of this Science all sickness and disease result from error and false belief, which are summarized as sin, and when the error of belief is destroyed by the truth which Christian Science imparts, the disease disappears. Christian Science, therefore, teaches that the cause of all disease and sin is mental, and not physical, and that both sin and disease may be cured by one and the same metaphysical process, namely, by the substitution of spiritual truth in place of error and false belief in the human consciousness.

"Ye Shall Know the Truth and the Truth Shall Make You Free"

It is recorded in the 8th Chapter of the Gospel of John that upon one occasion when Jesus was being harassed by the lawyers and theologians, who were plying him with questions and who were standing near, and said to them, "Ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free." In all of the Bible there is no statement of greater importance to mankind than this utterance of the Master. It prescribes the remedy for every human ill. Knowledge of a thing must come through the mental and not through the physical, hence, according to the words of Jesus, mankind will be delivered from sin, disease and death not by doctoring the physical, but by filling the mental with truth.

If this statement of Jesus was true it follows by irresistible logic that the enslaving conditions from which humanity suffers must be due to the belief of something which is not true. In other words, if the time is ever to come, as Jesus has declared that it will come, when the knowledge of the truth shall emancipate humanity from its bondage to sickness, sin, unhappiness, poverty, old age and death, such results can only be brought about when the knowledge of the truth shall have displaced and destroyed (out of human consciousness), the belief of

Y. W. C. A. News

Fifty years! A long look backward, but how golden may be the achievements of such a period of time. Fifty years ago in the classical city of Boston, thirty earnest women met to consider the needs of girls who came to that city to seek employment. The needs of these girls led to the organization of the first Young Women's Christian Association in this country, which was effected March 3, 1866. Down-town rooms were opened. The work at that time was largely that of an employment bureau, but educational classes, both vocational and cultural and religious meetings were also held. The first Young Women's Christian Association building was erected in Hartford, Connecticut, in 1872. Heretofore they had been purchased and remodelled. The first student Association was organized at Normal, Illinois, in 1873. The first summer home was opened at Asbury Park, New Jersey, in 1874. Today there are 245 city associations with a membership of 273,234. 98 associations placed 52,410 girls in positions last year. Practically all of these city associations now have down town rooms. 1,663 secretaries are on the employed staff of the Young Women's Christian Association. There are also many volunteer workers. Today thousands of girls in relays joyfully tie themselves to one of the 100 summer homes in various parts of the country for country air, rest, quiet hours with good books, bacon bats, corn roasts, athletics and water sports of all kinds according to the physical advantages of the location of these homes.

The local association was the recipient of a box of grape fruit and a box of King oranges last week through the generosity of Miss Alice Davidson from her fruit farm in Avon Park, Florida. They were delicious and when disposed of netted a nice little sum for the association.

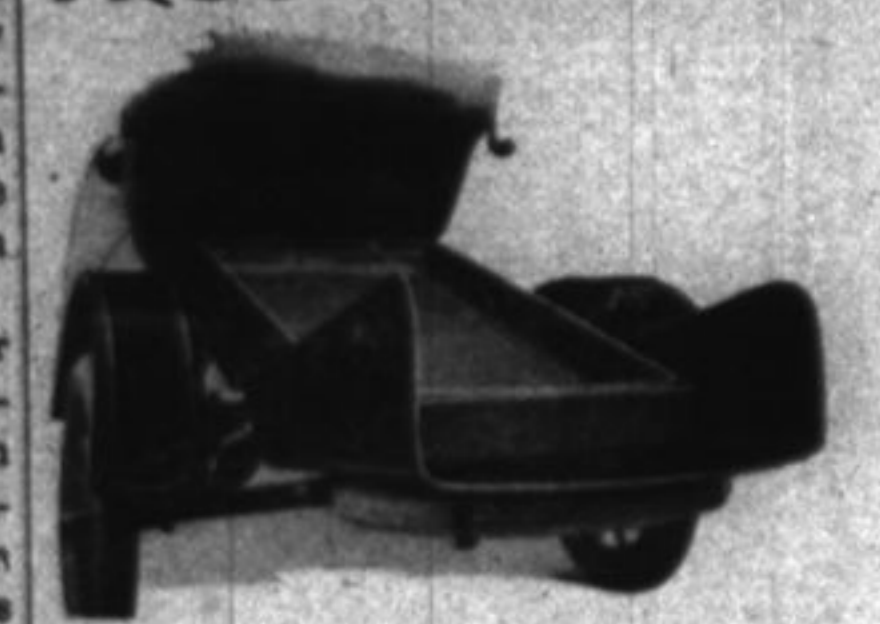
