 where any of them have levied less there would be a corresponding decrease.

Where valuations have been increased it does not follow that such increase has occurred in the last four years. There have been transfers on sales of property from the county line to the Moraine Road, and in all cases the sale price has corresponded with the basis on which all increased values have been made. I am inclined to think that if the taxpayers will carefully consider the statement from the County Clerk's office and the fact that Mrs. Ward has left our shores, they will readily see why our tax bills are higher.

On Monday afternoon the pupils gathered in the Auditorium to celebrate the birthday of George Washington.

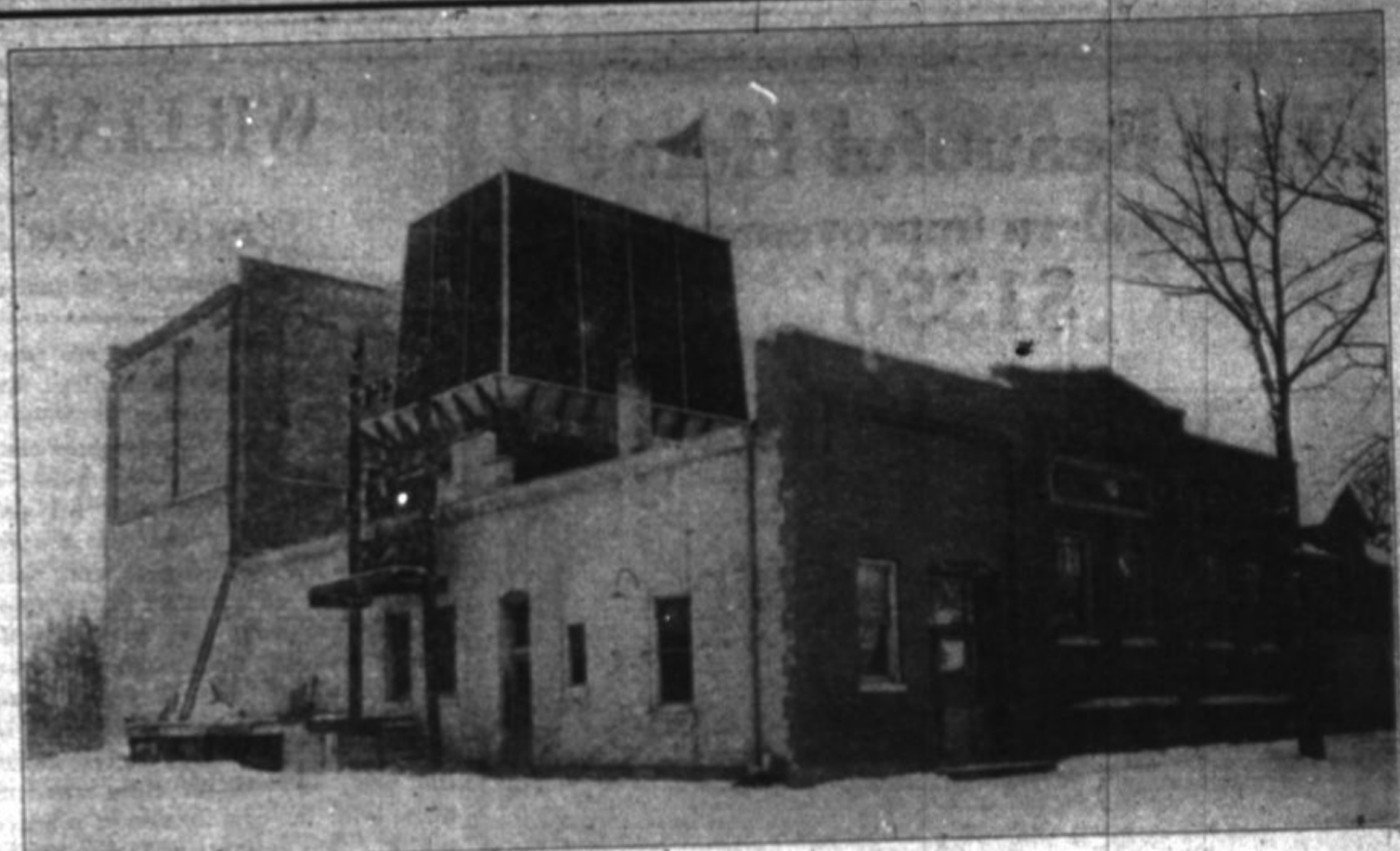
In the evening the members of the beginning class in English, of the night school were entertained at the school.
