For some time there has been great deal of dissatisfaction owing to the fact that it has been impossible to reserve books as was formerly the custom. Because of the complaints which have come directly to the librarians, an effort has been made to remedy this trouble. The Illinois Library Extension Commission was appealed to, as to what is more commonly done by libraries in this regard.

On the advice of the commission the following method will be adopted in the Highland Park Public Li-

Anyone may reserve a book by leaving at the desk, a post card addressed to himself, with the name of the book desired. These cards will be filed in order of date received. When the book comes in the card will be mailed, and the book reserved twenty-four hours from mailing of the card.

In another matter, there seems to be a little misunderstanding; that of the library's willingness to receive suggestions.

Any suggestions, especially in regard to books desired will be cordially welcome. Every suggestion may not be acted upon, on account of lack of demand or of funds, but all will be carefully considered. The library board and the librarians can better serve the greater number if
