

For State's Attorney

My Platform is a Simple One

Scores of men have been sued and prosecuted in civil actions, and damages have been recovered for sales to habitual drunkards. What the wife and child of the excessive drinker want is not blood money, but a substantial and a self-respecting husband and father.

When I am State's Attorney of Lake County, any wife and any child, coming to my office with a complaint that the husband or the father is an habitual drunkard, will receive a hearing, and I shall protect the people against such a condition, by employing the entire machinery of justice, against any man, who, after proper notice, shall violate the rights of such wife or child. Habitual drunkenness is the biggest problem confronting the genuine reformer. The habitual drunkard of Lake County must go.
