The Preliminary Clean-Up Day March 25th Resulted in Ten Wagon Loads of Tin Cans and Rubbish Being Carted Away by City Wagons

The Highland Park Civics Commission, endorsed by Mayor Samuel M. Hastings and City Commissioners, has designated a "Clean-Up Week" from April 8th to April 15th.

Every citizen of Highland Park should make an effort to clean up his house and property, clean up his front yard and his back yard, to clean out the down spouts and eave troughs of his house, to see that all ash and manure piles are removed, to paint his premises and to abolish all places that might breed flies and mosquitoes and to help his neighbor clean up vacant lots.

Get the boys in your neighborhood into a group and scour the vacant lots, woods and ravines for bottles, tin cans and rubbish.

Get the girls in your neighborhood into a group and with long-pointed sticks have them pick up the scraps of paper, blowing about our streets, which are a menace to every one's health.

This is an opportunity for every one in Highland Park, not only to show his personal, but his civic pride. A clean city means less typhoid fever and summer complaints, freedom from disgusting odors, general improvement in appearance and a valuable advertisement to your property and city.

All tin cans, bottles and rubbish should be carried to the parkway places in either baskets, boxes or receptacles of some kind. If all refuse is placed in such manner it can be easily loaded and carted away.

DO YOU WANT TO BE A "ROOKIE"?

Highland Park Sent Only Three to Fort Sheridan Last Summer

Highland Park, with a population of 7,000 sent only three "rookies" to the Military Training Camp at Fort Sheridan last summer.

Due to the lack of infantry troops and regular army instructors, only one locality at which several camps will be held can be arranged for during 1916.

The camps will be located on the Military Reservation at Fort Benjamin Harrison, ten miles from Indianapolis, Ind. The reservation is reached from Indianapolis by Inter-urban trolley.

The following dates for holding the camps have been selected:—First camp from July 5th to August 4th. Second camp from August 7th to September 6th. Third camp from September 8th to October 5th.

The second and third camps will be held only if condition of enrollment warrants such camps; 500 citizens being the least necessary for each camp.

Qualifications. An applicant for enrollment

(a) Must be a citizen of the United States or have taken out first papers.

(b) Must be between 18 and 45 years of age, though men otherwise qualified over 45 may be authorized to attend for special service.

(c) Must be of sound physical condition, capable of hard drill and maneuver marching with a full infantry equipment. Eyesight normal or corrected by glasses to admit of target practice.

(d) Must have a college education or the equivalent. By "equivalent" is meant a good elementary education, which has been supplemented by business or professional training. This is to be stated on application blank. A high school graduate is eligible.

(e) Must bear an excellent character in his community.

If you are eligible, your application is solicited. It is also requested that you invite eligible friends to attend. Where several men come to camp together, they can be assigned to the same company. Mail all applications and inquiries to Adjutant, Central Department, Federal Building, Chicago, Ill.

Wants to go to National Convention Unpledged and Free to Exercise His Judgement

John M. Glenn is a candidate for delegate from the Tenth Congressional District to the Republican National Convention which will meet in the Coliseum, Chicago, June 7, 1916.

Mr. Glenn has lived in the Tenth Congressional District for twenty years. For several years he was active in the political department of the Chicago Tribune, being one of the writers who worked directly under the late Joseph Medill.

Mr. Glenn left the newspaper work to become secretary of the Chicago Civil Service Commission. Following this he was chosen secretary of the Illinois Manufacturers' Association. He has held that position since 1898.

WAUKEGAN GOES DRY

Sixty-two Saloons in Waukegan and North Chicago Wiped Out

By a majority of 867 Waukegan Township was voted dry at Tuesday's election. This puts out of business, by May 1st, sixty-two saloons in Waukegan and North Chicago.

Libertyville, Grayslake and Lake Villa also voted dry while Antioch remained wet by a majority of 78.

VERCOE, LARSON, DOOLEY, DUFFY, AND CLAVEY WIN

Clavey and Vercoe Each Ran Ahead of their Tickets. Brand and Laing had a Tie Vote for Assessor Each Receiving 558, Against Duffy's 625

One of Deerfield Township's largest votes was polled at last Tuesday's election, there being a total of 1871, of which 720 were women and 1151 men. Mr. A. W. Vercoe was elected Assistant Supervisor by a plurality of 290, being the only candidate on the Conservative ticket to win.

James Duffy was elected Assessor by a plurality of 67 votes, winning over W. E. Brand and Frank Laing who were tied, each receiving 558 against Duffy's 625.

Fred Clavey who was elected Commissioner of Highways, piled up the largest vote of all. His total was 1161 against James Sheahan's 720, giving him a majority of 445. Mr. Clavey had no opposition on the Conservative ticket. Following is the total vote by precincts:
