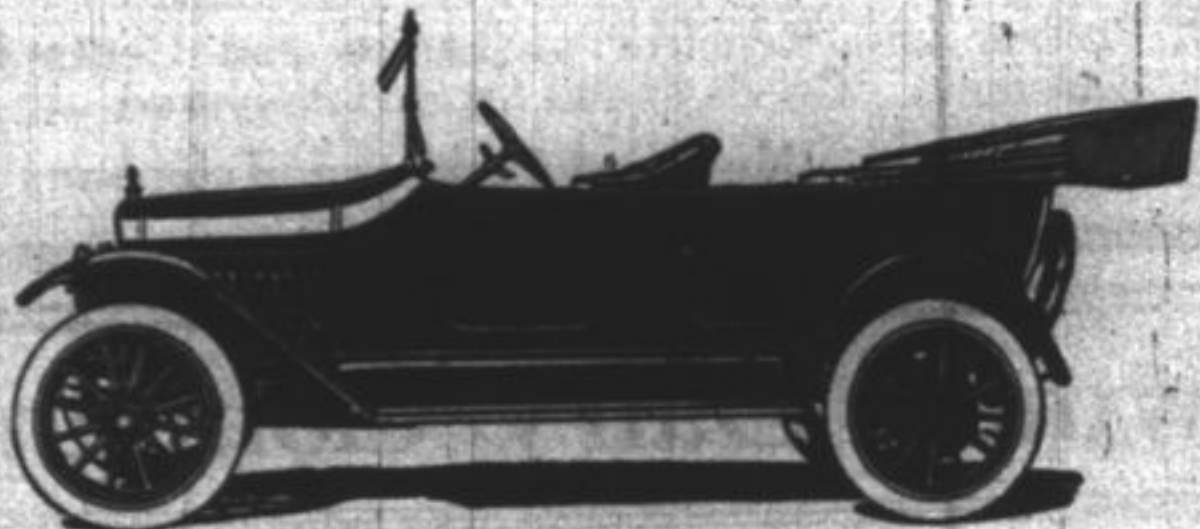

AN ORDINANCE

To Amend Section 555 of Chapter 51 of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Highland Park, Approved and Published May 2nd, 1911.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK:

Section 1. That Section 555 of Chapter 51, entitled "Streets" be and the same is hereby amended and changed to read as follows: "Section 555. Before any person or persons, firm or corporation, either as principal or agent, shall make any excavations or openings in any of the streets, alleys or public places of said city or do anything provided for in Section 553, such person shall apply in writing to the Commissioner of Streets and Public Improvements of said City for a permit in which application he shall state the place of said proposed opening and the purpose of same, which permit shall be good for a period of thirty (30) days from the date of its issue and shall provide the time in which said work shall be completed.

When said excavation or opening is made for the purpose of connecting any building with a public sewer, water main or gas main, or for any other purpose, there shall be deposited with the City Collector, a sum of money sufficient to pay the cost for properly restoring all excavations or openings made to the same condition existing prior to the excavation or opening being made, which amount shall be determined by the Commissioner of Streets and Public Improvements, and in no case shall the amount be less than \$30.00 which sum of money, or deposit, said city shall have the right to apply towards the cost and expense of properly relaying pavement or restoring excavations and furnishing material therefor, in accordance with the ordinances of the City of Highland Park, now or hereafter in force. The overplus, if any, shall be restored to the person depositing the same.

The said work shall be done by the Foreman of Public Works, under the direction and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Streets and Public Improvements.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication.

AN ORDINANCE

To Amend Sections 437 and 438 of Chapter 49 of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Highland Park.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK:

Section 1. That Sections 437 and 438 of Chapter 49, of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Highland Park, be and the same are hereby amended to read as follows, and not as heretofore:

Section 437. Peddlers of the second class shall pay an annual license fee of Twenty-five Dollars. All peddlers of the second class who shall ask for a license for a shorter term than one year shall be entitled to the same by conforming with the following rates: For one week, three dollars; for one month, eight dollars.

Section 438. Applications for licenses for peddlers of the first class shall be made to the mayor in writing, and each such application shall specify the number of wagons or other vehicles to be employed by the applicant in carrying on his said business, and upon the granting of the license by the Mayor, every such applicant shall pay to the city collector a license fee amounting to thirty dollars for each and every wagon or other vehicle drawn by one horse, so to be employed in said business; and the sum of fifty dollars for each and every wagon or vehicle drawn by two horses so to be employed in said business, and thereupon the city clerk shall issue said license. All peddlers of the first class who shall ask for a license for a shorter term than one year shall be entitled to the same by conforming with the following rates: For one week, five dollars for vehicles drawn by one horse and eight dollars for vehicles drawn by two horses; for one month fifteen dollars for each vehicle drawn by one horse and twenty-five dollars for each and every wagon or other vehicle drawn by two horses, so to be employed in said business for said time.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

SPECIAL ASSESSMENT NOTICE No. 225.

Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the City Council of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, having ordered that constructing a cast iron lateral main water supply pipe 6 in. internal diameter to be constructed and laid in, along and under St. John's Ave. from and connecting with the present 4 in. water main now laid in St. Johns Ave. and ending at a point in the line of the Sly. line of lot 19, block 75 of F. P. Hawkins Addn. in the City of Highland Park, extended Wly. across said St. and from thence extending Sly. parallel with and 26 ft. W. of the Ely. line of St. Johns Ave. for a distance of 552 ft. at which point it shall connect with the existing 6 in. water main, together with shut-off valves, fire hydrants and special castings, all in the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, the ordinance for the same being on file in the office of the City Clerk of said city and having applied to the County Court of Lake County for an assessment of the costs of said improvement according to benefits, and an assessment thereof, having been made and returned to said court, the final hearing thereon will be had on the 22nd day of April, A. D. 1916, or as soon thereafter as the business of the court will permit.

Said assessment is payable in three (3) installments, with interest at the rate of five (5) per centum per annum on all installments from and after date of issue of first voucher. All persons desiring may file objections in said court before said day and may appear on the hearing and make their defense.

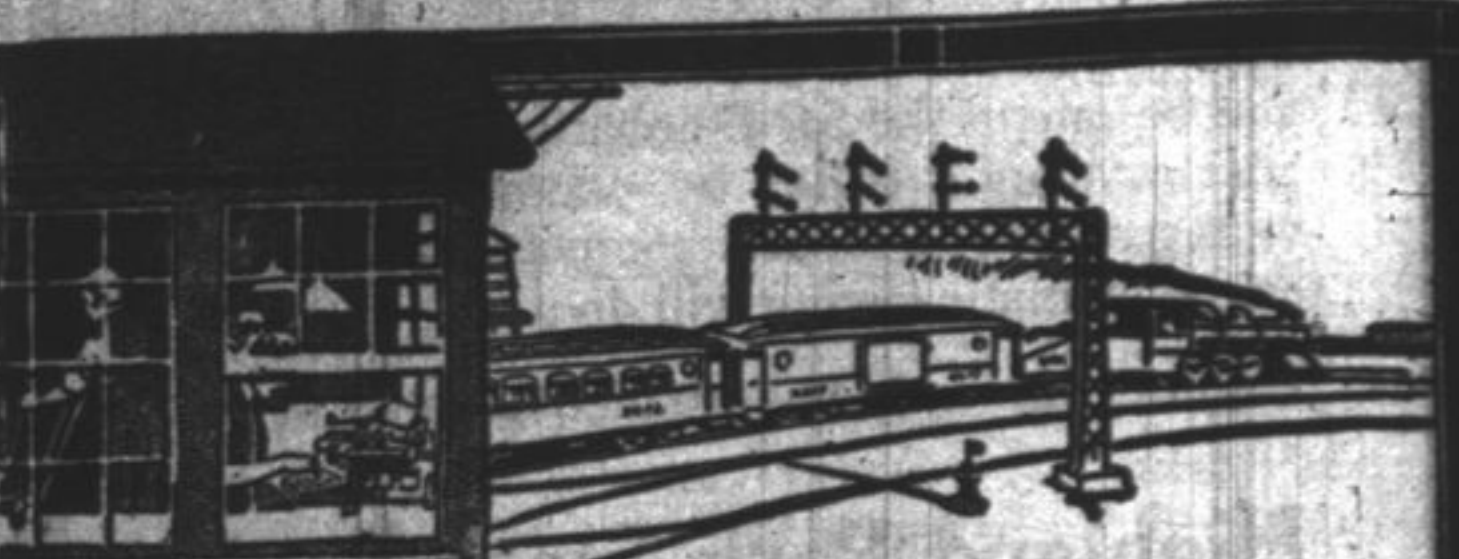
