was: "Our Lord's Example of  
Service." An address on the story of  
the hymns of the church, with solos by  
Mrs. Orsborn and Miss Grace Schlie  
and songs by the choir and congrega-  
tion made a most interesting and in-  
structive evening service.

A special evening service will be  
held next Sunday, also Palm Sunday,  
April 16th will be observed as Com-  
munion Sunday.

in the Assembly Hall of the Grammar  
School Friday afternoon. The chil-  
dren of the three primary rooms sang  
groups of three songs, showing the  
progress made by pupils in music.  
Some of the tiny tots who had only  
been in school one month sang very

well, and the third and fourth grade  
children showed exceptional ability in  
tone coloring. The meeting aside from  
entertainment given by the pupils was  
purely a business one. The Associa-  
tion arranged for the moving picture  
entertainment and voted an appro-  
priation from the treasury of two hun-  
dred dollars for the beautification of  
the school house grounds, a plan of  
which was exhibited. Five o'clock tea  
was served by the social committee.
